

REVITALISATION OF HOLBROOK MEMORIAL HALL. Work started on the internal refurbishment on Monday 7 April and the first phase is nearing completion. This has involved a complete refit and rewiring in the kitchen, backroom and the toilets. The new decoration in this area makes it look very vibrant and clean. The removal of the asbestos is now complete. In the summer holidays, the main hall will be rewired and the ceiling will be tidied up. The PCC has also approved the replacement of the main hall floor, which is breaking up quite badly and is becoming a safety hazard. This will happen later during the summer at a cost of about £13,000 and will give us a new floor made of similar timber to the current floor, which will hopefully last another 100 years. There will be some fund raising events to help pay for this. We have been successful in obtaining a grant of £3,500 from Leicester City Council, Knighton Ward towards the cost of the floor. Finally, we are thinking about a "Grand Opening" on Remembrance Sunday 9 November when all the work is completed (Bishop Christopher and the City Mayor Peter Soulsby are coming). There's a lot going on! Our thanks to Steve Bowyer, Gary Ogg and the team working on the project.

THE REVD RICHARD WRITES Both Peter and Paul were strong personalities. It is not surprising to find that on occasion they clashed: one such occasion was at Antioch over the requirements to be placed on Christian converts of Gentile origin to enter into table fellowship with established Christians formerly of Jewish background. The story is told by Paul in Galatians (2:11-14):

- (11) When Peter came [back] to Antioch, since he was to be pronounced guilty I opposed him to his face.
- (12) For until some of James' assembly [had] arrived he was [still] eating with the Gentiles, but when they [had] arrived, he drew back and separated himself [from the Gentiles] being afraid of those of circumcision.
- (13) And the rest of the Jews also played along with him, so that Barnabas [too] was carried away by their hypocrisy.
- (14) But when I saw that they were not upright with the truth of the Gospel, I told Peter in front of everyone: If you [already] being a Jew are living in the manner of a Gentile, that is not in the manner of a Jew, why do you urge to judaize the Gentiles?

The 'Antioch Incident' has led to much comment and discussion among New Testament scholars. The issue of admission to table fellowship and thus to the Lord's Supper was clearly important, but the underlying conflict, it seems, was about the requirements to be placed on Gentiles before they were considered of equivalent status / commitment to Christians of Jewish origin. In the case of males, was circumcision a requirement (in other words, did you have to become a full Jew first, in order to become a Christian?). Paul argued against this, and accused Peter of backsliding.

Peter 'lives' and 'eats' like a Gentile Paul tell us – that is, until the delegates arrived from Jerusalem. Gentile converts, proselytes (circumcised converts), and pagans open to the traditions of Judaism were often seen in a positive light. There were so-called God-fearers, Gentiles with a fundamentally open attitude towards Judaism, but it is not certain to what degree these were expected to keep the Torah. James Dunn thinks Peter withdrew from table fellowship (Galatians 2.12) either because he felt the demand was reasonable and he could not deny the authority from Jerusalem ('James' assembly': 2.12), because he could also sense the national tension in that period, or that he simply yielded to the demands to not risk open conflict between Jewish groups and interests. Perhaps, he even felt convinced by the large number of Jewish recruits that were willing to live righteously, in full attendance.

Paul on the other hand was advocating a new type of 'equality in Christ'. If the Gentiles of the Christ-believing community were found to be sinners, then that would count for Jews as well. For Dunn it means that the predominant view of Paul was that the covenant could not be everything: Faith also played a big part. Paul saw for the first time that justification through faith in the atonement of Christ meant a new way of thinking about the Jewish covenant as a whole.
