**REVITALISATION OF HOLBROOK MEMORIAL HALL.** Phases 1 & 2 of the work on the internal refurbishment, which were funded by **BIFFA**, are complete. **THE NEW FLOOR FOR THE MAIN HALL HAS NOW ALSO BEEN COMPLETED,** with a grant of £3,500 from Leicester City Council, Knighton Ward towards the overall cost of the floor of about £13000. The "Grand Opening" will take place on Remembrance Sunday 9 November. See WW1 diary dates below and on the noticeboard for further information.

DISASTERS EMERGENCY COMMITTEE APPEAL FOR GAZA. (Christian Aid is a member of the Committee.) The escalation in the conflict between Israel and Hamas has caused the humanitarian situation in Gaza to reach crisis point. Hundreds of thousands of people have fled their homes and are in desperate need of food, water and shelter. All 1.8 million people living in Gaza are without adequate access to medical care because the health system is on the brink of collapse. Safe water is limited, with 1.4 million Gazans with no or very limited access to water sanitation. 65,000 people have seen their homes damaged or destroyed and 24 hospitals and clinics have also been damaged. DEC members, made up of some of the UK's leading aid agencies, are supplying clean water, food and household items, emergency shelter and medical supplies. They are also helping children and other vulnerable people to cope with the psychological effects of the conflict. But they urgently need your help because the humanitarian need is so great. That is why we have launched the DEC Gaza Crisis Appeal. Just £25 can buy 150 bandages for the injured. £50 can feed five families for a day and £100 can provide an emergency shelter kit and blankets for one family. There are Christian Aid envelopes available in Church. Please gift aid if possible.

THE REVD RICHARD WRITES One of the reasons we may be reluctant to invite others to our Church events may be a fear of rejection. We need to think carefully about this fear and overcome it so that we are freed up to become effective servants of God who can welcome others to our Church in confidence. Our theme for the first two Sundays of September is changing our culture as worshippers from a culture of passivity to a culture of invitation and welcome. This is not easily achieved. That's why we've been thinking carefully about it and why we need to explain what it means to our congregation and to gain support for this collective enterprise as something of the greatest importance for our future.

In the report entitled From Anecdote to Evidence. Findings from the Church Growth Research Programme, 2011-2013 we read (p. 13): The most direct route to growth comes from members inviting and welcoming family, friends and acquaintances.

The next day again John was standing with two of his disciples, and he looked at Jesus as he walked by and said, "Behold the Lamb of God!" The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. Jesus turned and saw them following and said to them, "What are you seeking?" And they said to him, "Rabbi (which means Teacher), "where are you staying?" He said to them, "Come and you will see." So they came and saw where he was staying, and they stayed with him that day, for it was about the tenth hour [4 pm]' (John 1:35-39).

'Come' is the loving invitation, here used as a word of response. These men had been captivated by the radical difference of Jesus. They clearly desired to know more about him, to understand what made him who he was. The Lord's hospitality didn't start in a vacuum. It started with the integrity of his life making an impression on their souls. Clear and public attention to Jesus created the possibility for Jesus to ask them the first question, 'What are you seeking?'

'Come and see' is the preparation to help our friends hope for a glimpse of the glory. 'Stay' is the loving call to identification. As important as it is for people to come and see, the ultimate test of a relationship with God through Jesus Christ is staying. They came in, they saw, they stayed and it changed their lives forever.

We need to follow our Lord in his 'come, see and stay' love for the stranger. There are strangers to Christ all around us and he calls us to care about their eternal homelessness. Welcoming the stranger into Christ's home begins with: (1) Asking them what they are seeking; (2) Sharing with them the home we have in the worship of God in the church; and (3) Staying with them for as long as it takes for them to stay in Christ's love. Hospitality is the path that loves the stranger into God's home. And that path needs to run right through our lives.
