

THE REVD RICHARD WRITES *STOP PRESS* DATE OF OPENING OF THE MEMORIAL HALL AND PHOTOGRAPHS OF THE EVENT RECENTLY REDISCOVERED. The apparent lack of any surviving parish magazine for Knighton between 1914 and 1922 has made it difficult to ascertain how the Memorial Hall was funded, the role of the community in supporting the effort, and the date of official opening of the new facility. It is now known that the date of the official opening was Saturday 23 October 1920 and that there are surviving photographs of the event. What follows is a summary of three newspaper reports.

Knighton's tribute to the fallen comprises a war Memorial Hall on the Holbrook Road and a beautiful marble tablet in the Church of St Mary Magdalen. The quaintly-built and commodious hall, which adjoins St Guthlac's Church, was opened by the Lord Bishop of Peterborough (Dr Woods) on Saturday afternoon. A large number of parishoners assembled in the Memorial Hall on Saturday afternoon for the opening. The Hall was designed by Messrs Stockdale, Harrison and Sons,* and built by Mr H. M. Dudgeon and the approximate cost is nearly £5,000.

The Vicar (the Rev R E Roberts) said they were particularly grateful to several Nonconformists who had been kind enough to subscribe to the fund, and also to the large number of subscribers who had never attended either of their churches. (Hear, hear.) Acknowledging the splendid service of the Memorial Committee, the vicar said that it had seldom fallen to the lot of a parish priest to be surrounded and supported by more competent or more willing lay workers than he had in th[is] parish. He reminded his hearers how badly equipped with centres of social activity the parish of Knighton was left when it was split up [by the formation of St John's in 1917], and said that was the reason it was decided that the war memorial should take that form. They had met with unexpected difficulties, however, and although they had raised up to the present £1,000 in excess of the original estimate of the cost, they had still some way to go before they had cleared the actual expense involved.

They wanted the hall to serve as a social centre and for the stimulation of intellectual interests – not to deteriorate into a mere billiard or dancing saloon. Mr Oram had offered to start a library with 100 first-class books, and Mr Mallory had some excellent schemes. But they must not merely become a smug, prosperous, self-contained family, but remember that it was only by taking an increasing share in the general work of the church that they would find in their midst a memorial that was at all worthy of those who served them so faithfully and fell so gallantly in the great war. (Applause.)

THE BISHOP OF PETERBOROUGH ON THE LESSON OF NEIGHBOUR-LINESS

The Bishop warmly congratulated the parish upon its achievement, because it marked that which was needed more than ever to-day – the social side of the work of the Church. He hoped they were coming back to the idea that the Church was the social centre of the parish...

The Church had to teach the real root secret of neighbourliness. Social distinctions must have no meaning within their borders, and there must be nought but service and love and goodwill. Every hall like that should be the workshop in which people of various social grades and various outlooks in life and various schools of thought should be able to meet on terms of equality. (Hear, hear.) Knighton had perhaps known its cliques and sets of people who looked askance at one another. But everyone should know those who were their fellow worshippers. There were many things the Church needed to try to teach other people, and indeed learn herself, but there was no greater task they were concerned with than the teaching of true neighbourliness, and he believed that hall would prove a powerful instrument for carrying out that task... (Applause.)

^{*} This information was not previously known. It could be a mistake (confusing the Hall with St Guthlac's Church); but if correct then it makes the Hall of particular architectural significance.
