THE REVD RICHARD WRITES 'In a world of total moral collapse there was a small minority who mustered extraordinary courage to uphold human values. These were the Righteous Among the Nations. They stand in stark contrast to the mainstream of indifference and hostility that prevailed during the Holocaust. Contrary to the general trend, these rescuers regarded the Jews as fellow human beings who came within the bounds of their universe of obligation' (Yad Vashem, the Holocaust Memorial Centre in Israel).

The cover illustration depicts the Yad Vashem diploma of honour awarded to the small French village of Le Chambon-sur-Lignon and surrounding area as a place of Righteous Gentiles, recognizing the number of Jews who were saved from the Nazis by the Protestant pastor, André Trocmé, and 34 other inhabitants of the village. This Protestant village, it pronounces, 'became a haven for Jews fleeing from the Nazis and their French collaborators'. 'With their history of persecution as a religious minority in Catholic France, empathy for Jews as the people of the Old Testament, and the powerful leadership and example of their pastor André Trocmé and his wife, Magda, the people of Le Chambon acted on their conviction that it was their duty to help their "neighbours" in need.' The Yad Vashem memorial to Le Chambon-sur-Lignon and neighbouring communities contains a quotation from the Prophet Isaiah: 'thy people also shall all be righteous' (Isaiah 60:21).

An article by Alicia J. Batten published in 2010 looks at the materials used by Pastor Trocmé and how his message of welcome was spread among his congregation. Under his predecessor there had been weekly neighbourhood meetings at peoples' homes which focused upon biblical studies. Moreover, there were Sunday afternoon meetings, which had been characterized by lively discussion of biblical issues and critical theological questions. Trocmé held biblical studies meetings with 13 members of the parish every two weeks during the war years. The pastor would meet with these people, many of them youth leaders, and work through a discussion of biblical passages and prayers addressing how these issues applied to the community: 'it was there, and not elsewhere, that answers from God came regarding the complicated problems we had to resolve for the housing and hiding of Jews in the coming months. It was there that we conceived of non-violent resistance'.

In 1943–1944 the biblical studies group examined the teachings and parables of Jesus. The approach was guided by six thematic questions: 1) What is the mission, message and method to be disciples of Christ in the world? 2) How to enter into the service of Christ or the kingdom of God? 3) How does that which Jesus has done for us make us capable of serving him? 4) How is repentance central? 5) How can we remain in the service of Christ? 6) As judgment awaits us all, how must we be prepared? For example, when focusing upon discipleship he combines three ideas: love of neighbour, moral revolution, and prudence. For his thesis he guides the group to read the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25–37), Matthew's teaching about the sheep and the goats and the notion of caring for the 'least of these' (Matt 25:31–46), and several other illustrations of love of others. Then he asks if one can speak of the love of God without manifesting the love of neighbour. He enquires about what happens if a Christian preaches the gospel but fails to care for others.

After the award by Yad Vashem to Le Chambon, Joseph Loconte wrote: 'The remarkable deeds of grace at Le Chambon remind us that the Christian gospel is, fundamentally, a story about a rescue mission. It is a narrative of redemptive love in the face of great evil. It was this message that helped sustain those faithful villagers in the French Alps and in all their other outposts of mercy during Nazism's raging storm. "Greater love has no one than this," Jesus said, "than when a man lays down his life for his friends."
