THE REVD RICHARD WRITES Last week, when talking about the role of Le Chambon-sur-Lignon and surrounding area as 'a haven for Jews fleeing from the Nazis and their French collaborators', I quoted the Yad Vashem testimony which referred to the Protestants' 'history of persecution as a religious minority in Catholic France'. This week, because rather surprisingly South Korean television are interviewing me on the subject, I am thinking very much of that history of persecution. It led many Protestants (Huguenots) to flee France especially after 1685 when their religious freedom was denied by Louis XIV, who revoked the concessions granted by his grandfather Henri IV under the terms of the edict of Nantes of 1598. The cover illustration – part of the Protestant propaganda campaign at the time – shows the forced conversion of a Huguenot as a result of the threatening conduct of a dragoon. The policy of billeting troops on Protestant households to achieve their conversion was the technique used to enforce (Catholic) religious uniformity in France during the 1680s.

Many Protestants fled abroad and some rulers, such as William III and Queen Mary after the Glorious Revolution, welcomed them and guaranteed that their respective 'trades and ways of livelihood'. As a result, some of the Huguenots prospered and within a generation or two had become very wealthy. Silk weavers, who brought with them the latest techniques were one category of Protestant migrant who did well for themselves. So too did clock makers. Some of the most celebrated 'English' clockmakers, such as Simon de Charmes, whose clocks sell at fabulous prices today were in fact Huguenots. Though the Huguenots did well

for themselves, they were not (as is sometimes said, including by the Bank of England itself) the founding fathers of the Bank of England in 1694. Huguenot holdings in the Bank never exceeded 10 per cent, and out of 24 directors of Francophone origins in the Bank's first half century, 13 were descendants of immigrants from Walloon Flanders, and only five were of relatively recent French origins. The Houblon family, who had substantial holdings in the Bank and provided many of its directors, were fourth-generation immigrants from Lille in 1567 (Lille was then part of the Spanish Netherlands). Only one original Bank Director (Theodore Janssen) was a first-generation Huguenot immigrant. The Bank of England website needs to correct its facts!

France's loss was England's gain, and this has often been the story of immigration. Of greater importance, however, was England's (and Scotland's and Ireland's) welcome in terms of asylum. The world's great religions are in agreement that there should be no coercion in matters of personal faith. Unfortunately, some of the more extreme fundamentalists on the fringes of the faith make sure that such coercion does indeed happen. As Christians we tend to think that 'we' are somehow 'better' than those of other faiths in which such coercion is sometimes practised. The Huguenot migration from France reminds us that it was not so long ago that Christians were every bit as intolerant as fundamentalist groups active in the world today. And it was not just Catholics being intolerant of Protestants; in Ireland some of the very same Huguenots who had experienced intolerance first hand became the first 'Orange men' and meted out some of that same intolerance to Catholics. The only difference was that whereas in France the minority Protestants had been the underdogs in Ireland the minority Protestants ruled the roost. And Ireland has continued to suffer into modern times as a result.
