

EBOLA CRISIS APPEAL (DISASTERS EMERGENCY COMMITTEE AND CHRISTIAN AID) Christian Aid envelopes are available for you to support this appeal. The explosive spread of Ebola in West Africa is not just killing the infected but ripping apart health services, devastating communities, and destroying people's ability to support themselves. More than 4500 people have died and over 10,000 have been infected by the Ebola virus. The outbreak is not only a health crisis, but also a humanitarian crisis with global dimensions.

THE REVD RICHARD WRITES The Letter from the House of Bishops to the People and Parishes of the Church of England for the General Election 2015 entitled *Who is my Neighbour* suffers from being too long and at times difficult to read. It will not attract a large audience though it has already been dismissed by a number of newspapers under the mantra of 'meddling bishops' or 'meddling in politics'. They should know better. Politics is not the exclusive domain of politicians and journalists who fawn to the prejudices and business interests of the current owners of their newspapers. Everyone, or almost everyone (that is another debate) has the right to vote. And the Church of England is one of the last few institutions in touch, through its parishes, with the whole of the country (England, that is). Before a general election whose result will be of great importance for state and society alike, the bishops felt compelled by their faith to spell out the need for politics to recover the language and conviction of serving the common good. It was an important and necessary aim.

The majority of the country may no longer have faith, but those who lead the church do – and the bishops remind the rest of us of our (largely forgotten or ignored) Christian roots. The whole point about Jesus Christ, they argue, was that he came upon this Earth and experienced the human condition before meeting a painful death. 'Christians everywhere and throughout the ages,' they write, 'have prayed, as part of the Lord's Prayer, "Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done, on Earth as in heaven." That is why politics and the life of the Christian disciple cannot be separated. That is why the church calls its members to play a full part in

the political life of the nation.' There needs to be once more a spirit of respect, neighbourliness and a mutual search for the common good.

They cite St Paul's letter to the Philippians (4:8) as an inspiration that should motivate believers and nonbelievers. 'Whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.' At present, 'we are subjected to sterile arguments about who might manage the existing system best. There is no idealism in this prospectus.' The advice of St Paul 'may help to defend us against the temptations of apathy, cynicism and blame and instead seek – because we are disciples of Jesus Christ who long for a more humane society – a better politics for a better nation.' The bishops' advice that constitutional change should not being rushed, least of all for party advantage (paras 97-99) and on identity and the politics of migration (paras 100-105) are just two examples of sensible words on current debates, where their opinion is of vital importance for the future and moral wellbeing of our nation.
