ST GUTHLAC'S CHURCH EXTENSION COMMENDED IN 2014 CIVIC SOCIETY AWARDS The Newsletter of the Leicester Civic Society states: 'St Guthlac's Church South Knighton was built by Stockdale Harrison in 1912. A small scale building, it provided no room for any modern facilities. The ingenious answer to this problem was to reconstruct the west façade at the end of an entirely new west bay that the casual visitor would be unaware was not a part of the original building. This purely local effort just shows what can be achieved by sympathetic alterations to our historic built environment. Commended.' THE REVD RICHARD WRITES Let's face it. I don't think it very likely that St Guthlac's will become one of the large 'megachurches' of the type that they have in the United States. And I don't think that this sort of model would be suitable for us in any case. We are praying for growth, and we expect to grow. But we are always likely to be a medium-sized church. We can seek to be 'lean and focused'. We already know some of the skills that members of our congregation have, so this can lead us to undertake certain tasks which we will be able to achieve better than others. If we already know, as we do, some of the things what you are passionate about, gifted for and already involved in, then we can discover together how to turn regular responsibilities and unique giftedness into ministry opportunities. Developing good intergenerational relationships within the church are a means of making sure young people keep the faith and do not drift away through boredom or the false allure of other distractions. We should also recognize that smaller churches have a great opportunity to become an integral part of the local fabric of their communities and reach out to the people on the margins who often are not attracted to larger congregations.

Number one in the list of benefits that accrue particularly to smaller churches is the quality which is said to be easily recognized but difficult to define: 'authenticity'. Now one way of looking at this is to say that we should be true to ourselves and that our lives should live up to the convictions we proclaim. Small churches more often than large ones truly function as a family, with all the blessings and challenges that this brings with it. So authenticity in one sense means 'genuineness' and in another 'hospitality'. We must be the people we proclaim ourselves to be. Most important of all, it means 'authenticity' in meeting God in worship. In worship we have the opportunity not only to open our hearts to hear from God but to give ourselves to God. Whenever we authentically meet with God in worship, something always happens. We never walk away the same. What happens is more than just a feeling. To some degree, a personal transformation takes place. The essence of authentic worship is sensing the presence of God and then responding with our whole heart. When Isaiah took in the majesty, power, and holiness of God, he responded by saying, 'Here am I. Send me!' (Isaiah 6:8).

Any conversation about authentic worship must also ask, 'What is authentic to *God*?' First, to be authentic to God we must be true to who he is: *triune*. God is three persons, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. So often in our songs and prayers we neglect to name God for who he is and how he acts in worship. Much of our worship expresses an ambiguous God or Lord who is largely passive, waiting for us to give him praise. But the Father is active, calling us to worship; the Son is engaged in perfecting our worship, and the Spirit empowers worship's every breath.

Second, to be authentic to God we must be true to his *creation*. Third, to be authentic to God we must be true to his *church*. God's saving purpose extends well beyond the walls of our local congregations. It includes a church of all times and all places. Authentic worship embraces the timeless wisdom of those who have come before us and shares in the joys, sufferings, and gifts of the global church. In particular at this time we have to walk and pray with the suffering Christians of the Middle East. Authentic worship is about us. But it is also about God, his creation, and his church. How authentic is our worship? In what ways can we ourselves become more genuine or authentic?
