THURSDAY MORNING HOLY COMMUNION. During the summer these services will continue as usual except for three dates when Revd Richard is unavailable: Thursday 9 July; Thursday 23 July; and Thursday 20 August.

THE REVD RICHARD WRITES The recent attacks by extreme jihadists in Tunisia, France and Kuwait (the latter an attack by Sunni extremists on a Shia mosque) once more brings to the fore what sort of enemy are we dealing with, and how do we do so? The attack on the tourists at Sousse led to the largest loss of British lives in a terrorist outrage since 7/7 a decade ago. An appropriately strong response is warranted. But how to do so without making matters worse? There are separate responses at home and abroad. At home, as one newspaper expressed it, 'Britain must mourn, but also stand true to its free speech traditions, and hope that its government can still be persuaded to do the same'. Abroad, there must be even more international collaboration in counter-terrorism than has previously been the case. There is no quick fix. It is a long, difficult journey which will require an ongoing commitment of resources to an agreed strategy. All of which requires statesmanship rather than grandstanding and the pursuit of the common good rather than narrow political self-interest.

Christians have a special responsibility, but particular care needs to be taken by all of us that the faith of Islam is not demonised in the conduct of the war on terror under another name. Dr David Garrison, who calls himself a historian, is a missionary pioneer with the Southern Baptist International Mission Board. He is presently touring the UK promoting his book entitled *A Wind in the House of Islam*. He seeks to document a Muslim 'movement to Christ' in more than 70 places across 29 countries. Converts, he says, now number between two and seven million. He claims that this represents the 'greatest turning of Muslims to Jesus Christ in history'. The trend, he contends, is underpinned by a 'tremendous amount of prayer'. Other elements include a 'yearning for something different' arising from violence within the Muslim world; the power of the internet; and the translation of the gospel and missionary materials (including videos) into the 'heart languages' of Muslim people. Translating the Qur'an into local languages has 'backfired', he suggests. 'It reveals to Muslims that there's no assurance of salvation in there, when it's so clear in the gospel.' Muslims can learn about Jesus

through the Qur'an, and can contrast what is said of him with what is said of the Prophet Muhammad.

Although Dr Garrison writes early on that the book is not 'a triumphalist account of Christendom's victory over the Muslim world', he does use the language of 'contest'. 'If you believe that people's eternal destiny is related to their relationship to God, obviously there's an element there in which you are saying, "This is vitally important; it's not an insignificant or inconsequential issue." In one passage he writes: 'Wherever Islam has triumphed, dissent has been silenced, and conversion to the Christian faith, or any other faith for that matter, has been punished by death. Islam, as both a religion and an ideology, is a threat.' He does not want to offend Muslims, Dr Garrison says, but to inform and encourage them, and 'perhaps awaken within them a realisation that God loves them, and [that] he is extending to them the gospel of Jesus Christ uniquely, in this day and age...' He reports that one Muslim man who read the book while in a plane in mid-air had decided to become a Christian by the time he landed.

Garrison's A Wind in the House of Islam has divided opinion. There are those who believe that we should be even handed in conversion, rejoicing when Christians become Muslims or Hindus quite as much as when Muslims or Hindus become Christians: the importance here is the fulfilling spiritual path found by the individual convert. 'Only rejoicing when other people become Christian is partisan, and not a good example. The longer we talk competitively, and use the language of threat, the further away we push more constructive, loving interactions.' Related to this argument is the view that none can claim 'absolute truth, because God is greater than anything we can know. Salvation is in God's hands'. A different argument is that proselytism is inherent in both Christianity and Islam. A great deal of effort and money is devoted to dawa (conversion) around the world by Muslim groups. In these circumstances Christians should expect the same opportunities for seeking to convert Muslims in Muslim-majority countries as Muslims receive in non-Muslim-majority countries. There is every reason to celebrate when a person voluntarily decides to become a disciple of Jesus Christ. As long ago as 1991, a statement on inter-religious relations noted that many wish to share their faith with others and for some 'this entails inviting others to accept a belief or practice as their own'; but it is important that religious freedoms are not abused 'in order to pressurise others into changing their religious identities, beliefs or practices'. 'We also recognize the damage which has been done to inter-religious relations in the past by forced conversions and the use of unfair inducements to change religion, and we acknowledge the pain which this has caused'. Next week we will look more closely at Rowan Williams' arguments about the relationship between the faiths and our own Christian discipleship, which are to date the most profound Anglican statement in this area.
