THE REVD RICHARD WRITES: At first sight, degree congregations held by Universities and church services do not have much in common. The first are usually very large occasions; the second usually no more than small to medium events. The degree congregations are formal occasions, with invitations and elaborate lists of the graduands receiving degrees. It's important that individuals don't get muddled up, and somebody doesn't end up receiving someone else's degree. Having been to five different degree ceremonies over relatively recent times, apart from some of those at Leicester, I am struck by one really important thing which degree congregations and church services (here I am thinking of baptisms and weddings in particular) do have in common: the need for a good welcome. Welcome can come in different forms, but when you arrive at a place with which you are not familiar, you need to know a number of things more or less at the same time. Where are the 'facilities'? What happens (what am I to expect)? About how long will things take (especially important for babies and young toddlers)? We probably do not need to improve our signposting very much (although it is surprising how many people go to the hall first), although this is an absolute 'must' for universities. What we still tend to forget is just how few 'outsiders' now have much, or indeed any, experience of 'church'. Our language therefore may need to include lots of explanations on the way. Why are things done this way (and, just as important, not the other way)? And how best do we convey things spiritual and 'other' without the service sounding like some magical rite of initiation? There is no magic formula, no single way of doing it correctly. Much depends on the personalities involved in a baptism or wedding service. But continually reviewing and refreshing how we do things must be our guide. Did we feel the Holy Spirit moving in the Church on this occasion? Did the Holy Spirit infuse our welcome so that it was heartfelt and not just following the quidance notes for Leading your church into growth? Sometimes we receive very kind cards or notes of appreciation after baptismal and wedding services. These are a great blessing but must inspire us to be watchful that we do not rest on our laurels on the next occasion. Careful preparation is not just the preserve of the degree ceremony, but also a requirement for a successful church service.

PROPOSED PARISH OF ST GUTHLAC, KNIGHTON Following upon the receipt of documents on 15 January, we are now asked to consider a draft scheme for the establishment of a parish of St Guthlac within the benefice of St Mary Magdalen, Knighton. A successor to the Revd Keith Magee will in due course become Vicar of St Mary Magdalen as well as of St Guthlac, Knighton. I shall be asked to resign as Chairman of the Conventional District as well as Minister and will be licensed instead as Minister in Charge to serve in the benefice of St Mary Magdalen, Knighton with specific responsibility for St Guthlac, Knighton. The change has been requested by the PCC of St Mary Magdalen, Knighton 'in order to enhance the mission and ministry of both churches as well as formalise current practice'.

The scheme does not alter the existing status of the church of Saint Mary Magdalen, Knighton. It makes provision for Saint Guthlac to become the parish church of the new parish of St Guthlac, Knighton. A new PCC will have to be formed for the new parish. Notice of these proposed changes is to be posted in both churches on Sunday 24 January, with provision that anyone may make representations for or against part or parts of the scheme provided that they do so by Tuesday 1 March 2016.

We are asked to remind members of the congregation at services that this draft scheme exists so that people may inform themselves of what is proposed. Thereafter what happens depends on whether there are representations against the proposed scheme. If there are, there will be further consultations and delay. If not, the draft scheme will become 'the scheme', which will come into effect as soon as practicable.

SEMP EDGE PROJECT YOUTH CAFÉ We have seen 74 different young people come through our Youth Café since we started back up after the summer holidays. We are now averaging 21 young people per week, and seeing at least new face every week. Although we currently have 5 young leaders working on a rota system, we really need more adult support for the sessions. If you are interested in helping out in any way, please get in touch! We really value your prayers, and would ask you to pray for us over the coming weeks. Please continue to pray for adult volunteers for the Youth Café, that relationships with the young people strengthen and grow deeper, and new opportunities for conversations about the Gospel. Though the onus will be on parishes to arrange their events, the Church Buildings Council will act as a hub for ideas and as a central co-ordination point.
