THE REVD RICHARD WRITES: REASON FOR MY ABSENCE THIS CHRISTMAS

This is the first time since 2008 that I am unable to join you for the Christmas services at St Guthlac's. On Monday 19 December I am expected to undergo a procedure called transcatheter arterial chemoembolisation (TACE). A fine tube called a catheter is inserted into the main blood vessel in the groin (femoral artery) and passed along the artery to the main blood vessel that carries blood to the liver (hepatic artery). Chemotherapy medication is injected directly into the liver through the catheter and either a gel or small plastic beads are injected into the blood vessels supplying the tumours to help slow down the speed they grow at. Individuals react differently to the treatment. The most common side effect is post-chemoembolisation syndrome, which can cause some people to experience abdominal pain and a high temperature, as well as making them vomit or feel sick. These symptoms may last for up to a few weeks after a TACE session. Others are less adversely affected by the treatment and it is obvious which outcome I would prefer!.

DECEASE OF IAN FRASER It is with deep regret that I write to notify all members of the congregation of the decease of Ian Fraser at the Royal Infirmary on Monday night from complications arising from his liver cancer. Ian was a popular member of the congregation for many years and displayed a strong commitment to band music, bell ringing and the work of the choir. He was editor of the parish magazine for many years and a longstanding member of the Knighton Players. He was also sensitive to the needs of older worshippers and until his last illness very helpful in providing lifts to church for those without transport. He will be sorely missed. His closest relative is his brother, has arrived from New Zealand. The Churchwardens will keep members of the congregation informed of funeral arrangements when these are known.

ADVENT REFLECTION: HOPE

"During Advent we remember the wait for the Messiah whose birth, life, death and resurrection fulfilled hundreds of prophecies. We also anticipate the return of Jesus. The Christian faith is a hopeful one, it assures that we are loved, that we are worth saving for eternal life. That no matter how far we stray from being the ideal human, we are never too far away to seek God." (The Advent Creative Retreat Activity Book- M&M Fleeson).

Ps 27: 4-5 speaks of our longing, indeed our hope, that we will live in God's house all our lives and be kept safe by God through the storms of this life. We can often lose sight of this great gift God offers us because of the business and busy-ness of our lives. Advent is a time to taking stock; stopping, if possible, and returning to God and once again putting in the centre of our lives.

When our lives get that busy that we feel, "Where is God in all this"; Ps 42: 1-8 may offer us a way to turn again to God. God is always there it's more likely us who are not. The psalmist has some very useful guidance on what to do when you despair and wonder why you may feel so sad or troubled. It is simply that "I will put my hope in God, and once again I will praise him, my God and my Saviour."

NEW LOOK NATIVITY GIFT SERVICE This year's telling of the Nativity story will be brought to life by participants of all ages through 4 different dramatic scenes, with reflections by some of the characters. Bubbles have had a well-earned rest from planning the nativity this year and it has been put together by members of the worship committee. Your £530 now ensures a full delivery of medicines and Likuni Phala in January.
