THE REVD RICHARD'S WRITES:

THE REVD RICHARD WRITES. The value of a book bears no relation to its length. I have been trying to get through a biography of John Le Carré which some have reviewed favourably. So far the insights have not repaid the effort expended! On the other hand, I came across a 51-page booklet by Bishop Kallistos Ware ('the best known exponent of Orthodoxy in the UK') entitled *The Jesus Prayer* which has something to offer on practically every page.

The text on the rear of the cover offers the agenda for the booklet: 'The Jesus Prayer is the most popular devotional prayer in the Orthodox Church and increasingly popular in the West. A simple and direct method of invoking the mercy of Jesus Christ by repeating his Holy Name, it is a way of obeying St Paul's instruction to "pray always" (or "without ceasing": 1 Thessalonians 5:17). In an increasingly noisy and frenetic world, the Jesus prayer offers us an oasis of inner peace and a lifetime back to God.'

The exact words of the prayer may vary. The usual form, 'Lord Jesus Christ, son of God, have mercy on me' is based on the prayer of the blind beggar Bartimaeus outside Jericho: 'Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me' (Luke 18:38; Mark 10:47). Frequently the words 'a sinner' are added at the end 'have mercy on me a sinner'. This recalls the prayer of the tax collector in the temple, 'God be merciful to me a sinner' (Luke 18:13) and it gives to the Jesus a more penitential character. Sometimes 'on us' or 'on us and the world' are added. The prayer is implicitly Trinitarian. By invoking Jesus as son of God we think also of the Father while Paul tells us 'no one can say "Lord Jesus" except in the Holy Spirit' (1 Cor. 12:3).

Bishop Kallistos asks us what we mean by silence in a spiritual sense. Godawareness is one aspect (Ps 46:1): 'be still and know that I am God.' It implies relationship, not isolation. It is an attitude of receptivity and listening. When we are assailed by a stream of distracting thoughts, the Jesus Prayer helps us to dwell in God's presence, quiet and recollected. When our thoughts have drifted away, we do not have to ask ourselves 'where was I? What was I going to say next?' for we have only to take up once more the regular invocation of the Holy Name in the Jesus Prayer. The words should flow 'like a small murmuring stream', and in return we hear the 'still small voice' of God (1 Kings 19:13).

Bishop Kallistos contends that if our words and actions do not come out of the stillness of prayer, they turn out to be superficial and impotent. But if they have their source in stillness, they can prove words and actions of fire and healing. 'We can only truly change the world unless we have ourselves been changed by prayer... The Jesus Prayer is a prayer that make our contemplation active, and our action contemplative.'
