BISHOP MARTYN'S MEETING WITH THE CITY OF LEICESTER DEANERY LAY SYNOD Over the last few weeks Bishop Martyn has been visiting all the deaneries within the diocese of Leicester meeting with the lay representatives, the clergy and licensed lay member of the church in each deanery. On Tuesday 7th March he visited the City of Leicester deanery and met with all the lay deanery synod representatives. The purpose of his visits is to have the opportunity to share his vision for the diocese and to hear from the people of the church.

He explained that since coming to Leicester he has been reflecting on and living with Luke chapter 9 which is the passage in which he calls together the 12 and sends them out to preach the Kingdom of God and heal the sick. Jesus instructs the disciples "to take nothing" with them. Bishop Martyn shared his reflections on the following elements of the passage:

The need for the church to come together and then to be send out into the world and that this is what the Christian life and church must be about. Both elements are needed – the coming together as the body of Christ and then going out to share that message.

- Jesus instructs his followers to travel light and is there something in this for the church of the 21st century. Bishop Martyn stressed that this was in no way about throwing out the rich heritage of the church but looking at it again; were there things in it that we always did but did not know why when it was clear there might be better ways of dealing with the challenges facing churches in today's society e.g. could some sense prevail around the "rules" that govern the church?
- Luke Chapter 10 starts with the sending out of the 72 and he noted that between these two sending out events there had been a multiplication. He reflected that between these two events the feeding of the 5000 takes place (in Luke 9) which is another act of multiplication. But what can be drawn from this was that the multiplication of believers is possible when we were each willing to offer what little we have to Jesus (in the same way that the boy offered the five loaves and two fish yet all ate and there was left over).

Bishop Martyn said how very encouraged he is from what he has seen happening within the whole diocese of Leicester and that his vision for the diocese was rooted in the story of the mustard seed (so beautifully portrayed in the hanging we have in St Guthlac's) which puts down deep roots (i.e. deepening discipleship) and provides shade in the branches for the animals and birds to rest (growing the number of disciples and in the loving service that overflows into a world in need). In support of these aims he was particularly pleased that the following steps were being taken;

- Appointment of the first prior for the new monastic community in Leicester. This would be an opportunity for young people (18 30 yrs) to live, pray and serve in community for a year at a time. There were still details to be firmed up but at its core was the idea of called together and then sent out to serve.
- Funding had been received from the central church for work among black and ethnic minority communities. Initially this would fund a research project that would help shape a way forward for the diocese.
- Renewing the vision and purpose and putting three questions all people in the church to consider and making funding available through the Growth Fund and the Capital Fund to help churches fulfil this vision. Those questions being:
- 1. How are you growing, and enabling others to grow in the depth of their discipleship?
- 2. How are you enabling growth in the numbers of disciples of Jesus?
- 3. How are you serving your community, and enabling others to love and serve those around them?

Bishop Martyn also urged us to make use of the diocese resources and stressed that the diocesan office was there to support the life of the church in the parishes. He also suggested that PCCs might invite members of the diocese structures e.g. the mission and ministry team to find out how they might be able to help.

In closing Bishop Martyn encouraged all present also to take time to reflect on Luke 9 and on the vision and purpose of the church in this place. It was a good evening in that those present saw clearly the enthusiasm and commitment of the bishop to the work of the all (the laity and the clergy) which bodes well for the ongoing growth and deepening of the church in this city and county.
