

REVD RICHARD WRITES: When God speaks, how do we interpret his message? Christianity affirms - and for that matter so too do the other monotheistic faiths in the Abrahamic tradition, Judaism and Islam - that God speaks directly to us. When He does so, how do we discern precisely what message He is conveying to us? How do we know that we are not misinterpreting the message, bearing in mind that when God 'speaks' it is not necessarily through specific words but through a sense of His presence or His will? We are told that politicians sometimes claim that God has 'called' them or 'told' them to do something specific, and given that we do not always appreciate the outcome of their decisions or actions this may not inspire us with confidence that in our own case we have correctly interpreted his will.

In one of the the relatively few books on the subject - Divine Discourse by Nicholas Wolterstorff - the author takes the example of the conversion of St Anthony of Egypt (251-356), who sold all his possessions at the age of twenty and lived among the local ascetics. St Augustine records three episodes of what he interpreted as God speaking - two in his own life, and the third, the conversion of St Anthony, when Anthony was standing in a Coptic church and experienced a command of God to him. But the command to Anthony was not directly conveyed: it was indirectly conveyed by means of listening to the gospel according to St Matthew. 'If you wish to be perfect, go, sell your possessions, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven, then come, follow me.' Anthony was convinced that God had spoken to him then and there, telling him to give away his possessions. Suppose that Jesus, in fact, had been speaking metaphorically rather than literally? Would this mean that Anthony was wrong on that occasion, that God had not spoken to him in the way that he interpreted it, and which led to his lifetime conversion? Wolterstorff makes the distinction between 'divine presentational discourse' and 'divine authorial discourse.' Anthony was not wrong in his conviction. It didn't matter in this case what Jesus had meant by those particular words: it didn't matter what Matthew thought Jesus had meant by them; this was a case of divine discourse mediated by human locution. The reader uttered the words of the Gospel; God performed the act of 'speaking' to Anthony without using any words other than those of the Gospel. When Jesus says 'Go and do Likewise' in Luke's Parable of the Good Samaritan, He has undoubtedly spoken to innumerable Christians over the centuries in a similar way. All of which suggests that God's Word to us may be relatively easy to discern when it is mediated by means of hearing the Gospel. It is much less clear when the power of God is felt but there is no specific text to accompany it - and the recipient has to interpret the feeling, to understand what is meant by the sense, but not the words, of 'do this' or 'do likewise'. The reviewers of William C Spohn's Go and Do Likewise state that 'the practices of spirituality sharpen the Christian's capacities to discern what is appropriate. Intercessory prayer, meditation, discernment, forgiveness, Eucharist and solidarity with the poor are (or should be) themselves formed and informed by scripture. They sharpen our perceptions, train our affections and transform our lives.' No doubt. But perhaps the most important thing we can do is wait patiently and prayerfully. We cannot know God's purpose at first, not least because we do not understand his timeframe. What we do know, if we believe, is that His purpose for us
