

THE OLIVE TREE PROJECT

The olive tree is a universal symbol of peace and a powerful symbol of Palestinian rootedness in their land. But in the political turmoil of the Middle East today, trees that have survived hundreds of years have become casualties in the struggle for the control of the land. Olive trees have been a major source of income for Palestinians for centuries, with olive trees covering over 50% of agricultural land. The olive and olive oil industry supports the livelihoods of around 100,000 Palestinian families.

Since the Israeli occupation of the West Bank began in 1967, Palestinian farmers have lost hundreds of thousands of olive trees. Trees planted and cared for by generations of the same family have been destroyed or uprooted as Israeli settlers seek to claim Palestinian land as their own.

Through a joint initiative called 'Keep Hope Alive', Embrace partner East Jerusalem YMCA and the YWCA of Palestine plant and replant olive trees in Palestinian-owned areas that are at risk of confiscation. An olive tree can live for centuries. Olive groves hold huge cultural significance for Palestinian farmers whose families have owned the land for generations. Sponsoring an olive tree means you are helping the Palestinian people maintain their ancient ties to the land, preserving an important source of income and sustenance. Planted on fields at risk of confiscation, your tree will, when mature, produce a harvest of fruit that can be used for oil and soap products. Sponsor an olive tree for just £15

Sponsorship covers the cost of the olive sapling, planting and information for farmers on the best techniques for olive tree care and production improvement as well as some project implementation costs. Sturdy three-year old young plants are used, with tubing to protect them and irrigation pipes for fields that have access to water. You'll receive:

- Certificate identifying the location of the tree*
- Information on visits, so you will have the opportunity to help with the planting and harvest.
- Updates on the project and related work
 *Olive tree planting season starts in February and can last for many months
 depending on project implementation, weather and various political factors.
 Certificates are issued after the planting season is completed which is usually the
 end of May or the beginning of June. Any trees sponsored after the end of
 January will not be planted until the following year.

'Copy and paste the figures 31.6649, 35.15183 (EXACTLY as typed including comma) into the Google search field or, even better, Google Earth search field. The location is on a hillside about 500m west of Dekel a suburb of Efrat (Efrata), 6.5Km southwest of Bethlehem and 12.75Km south-southwest of Jerusalem.'
