Healing in Tough Times

"Jesus lifted up his hands and blessed them. While he was blessing them, he left them and was taken up into heaven. Then they worshipped him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy." (Luke 24.50-52)

During these tough times we have been focussed on stories of sickness, sometimes followed by death, sometimes followed by healing. We find death difficult to talk about but we also find healing a difficult thing. This is partly because when we pray for healing, the answer does not always come in the shape that we want.

In fact, health and wellbeing themselves do not come in the shape that we want. Human beings are very happy to have fit and healthy bodies – because then we feel less challenge to look to the health of our hearts and minds. In essence, we can avoid thinking about our deeper, more significant sickness if physically we are well.

Healing in tough times is not just about keeping safe and taking the advice and treatment recommended – although this is critically important. In tough times, when many of our usual supports and distractions are taken away, we have the chance to let the Great Physician examine us..... and to heal us.

In this sonnet, the poet Malcolm Guite reminds us that at his ascension Jesus 'took us with him to the heart of things' – having redeemed humanity he takes us into heaven too. There we find the heart of God himself now restored and hear a new song of healing 'that rises out of weakness'. This is now our song too, the song of hope and healing in a broken and sick world, through the risen, ascended Christ.

No change to lockdown restrictions for churches soon

Once again, my thanks to everyone who has done their own bit to keep us all in touch with each other, and to provide support for each other during the coronavirus pandemic. These are challenging times indeed and it has never been more important to be part of the fellowship of the church.

The lockdown restrictions that apply to church services have not changed however. Although one authorised person, normally the vicar, can now enter the church building to say prayers and celebrate the Eucharist on behalf of the whole congregation, there are no immediate plans to allow the people of the church to gather. We are at 'Stage One' of easing lockdown restrictions and there is no thought about any church services happening until at least 'Stage Three'.

The most hopeful timetable puts this date into July, and there would certainly be very many restrictions and precautions surrounding any re-opening of churches: we would have to maintain social distancing, refrain from singing and from using paper or books, take a register of all present, guarantee hand cleaning on arrival and departure, as well as deep clean the building afterwards. You will see that there are still very many hurdles to cope with before anything like Sunday worship as we know it could resume. Whilst this is disappointing it is wise and understandable caution of course.

I will endeavour to keep you updated with any changes. *Adrian*

Collect & Readings for the Seventh Sunday of Easter

The Collect

O God the King of glory, you have exalted your only Son Jesus Christ with great triumph to your kingdom in heaven: we beseech you, leave us not comfortless, but send your Holy Spirit to strengthen us and exalt us to the place where our Saviour Christ is gone before, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.. Amen

Acts 1: 6-14

⁶ So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" ⁷ He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸ But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all

Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." ⁹When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. ¹¹They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a sabbath day's journey away. ¹³ When they had entered the city, they went to the room upstairs where they were staying, Peter, and John, and James, and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James son of Alphaeus, and Simon the Zealot, and Judas son of James. ¹⁴ All these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer, together with certain women, including Mary the mother of Jesus, as well as his brothers.

Gospel Reading: John 17: 1-11

17 After Jesus had spoken these words, he looked up to heaven and said, "Father, the hour has come; glorify your Son so that the Son may glorify you, ² since you have given him authority over all people, to give eternal life to all whom you have given him. ³ And this is eternal life, that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent. ⁴ I glorified you on earth by finishing the work that you gave me to do. ⁵ So now, Father, glorify me in your own presence with the glory that I had in your presence before the world existed.

⁶ "I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. ⁷ Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; ⁸ for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. ⁹ I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. ¹⁰ All mine are yours, and yours are mine; and I have been glorified in them. ¹¹ And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one.

The Apostolic Waiting Room!

'Waiting' as a concept is part of our lives, a part brought very much to the fore presently as we await further safe relaxing of the pandemic lockdown. Here, normality, whatever that term will describe in future months and years seems some way off yet.

In past 'normality', waiting is part of life which simply can't be got rid of, despite us living in a world where an expectation of immediate fulfilment with little or no waiting is almost expected. Waiting can be amongst other things, exciting, frustrating, positive, pointless, fearladen, and any combination of these. For example, a visit to the dentist and sitting in the waiting room can be positive when the thought of toothache relief is 'just around the corner'. But this waiting is also fear laden as the sound on whining drills from 'just around the corner' does it's best to convince us that our toothache now feels much better and possibly liveable with!

A child on Christmas morning is rightly excited by the sight of a none too subtly wrapped shape 'under the tree', but when the paper has been ripped off, frustratingly, it isn't quite the desired article.

At an airport I love 'people watching' and this expectant waiting at the beginning of an exciting holiday is often mixed with the frustration of a delay due to an air traffic controllers strike nowhere near the route to be taken!

I wonder how the remaining 11 disciples and sundry others felt in their 'Upper Room' in one of our readings for today, at the beginning of the Acts of the Apostles, better described by scholars as the Acts of Peter and Paul or better still the Acts of the Holy Spirit? They were thrown together in one place and waited for what turned out to be ten days. We are presently having a taste of the same in lockdown if with others of our families and friends.

You can imagine therefore in one small Upper Room how individual traits and idiosyncrasies came to the fore and perhaps began to make them smile or even began to get under their skins. For the eleven, this waiting after such monumental events in their recent lives must have really really chafed. Many theologians, see the election of Matthias as a result of such frustration... simply something to do... and not much more... as we never hear of him again!

Perhaps, I suggest, they should have waited until St Paul happened along!

And so, I wonder how waiting and the spiritual fruit of patience listed by Paul in Galatians 5 and found in many other places of Scripture impacts on our spiritual lives? For myself, I am naturally very impetuous, and want to get stuff done 'yesterday', so in me patience has been a hard won growing of fruit by the Spirit ...so much so that I am not too sure that even now I react to things in the most patient of ways.

So, in these ten days alongside the enforced patience of lockdown, let us reflect on how we best deal with waiting in freer times and ask God to bless us each with patience and the remaining gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit this Pentecost.

Reflection, Sunday 24th May 2020, John 17.1-11

I hope and trust that you're still keeping well now that we're entering the tenth week of our 'lockdown'.

Two things in particular will stay with me when we get to 'the other side'. The first is the opportunity that many of us have had to be closer and more connected to the natural world....to hear birdsong more clearly, to appreciate our gardens.

The second is the ingenuity and creativity that lies innate in all of us and has had the chance to bubble up while we've been so much less busy (with apologies to key workers who have been so exceptionally busy on our behalf!). This creativity has shown itself in many ways, from the boom in home baking, to jokes and photographs on social media, to facemasks fashioned at home from scraps of material.

Significantly there has also been a recognition that now we need creative *thinking* as we start to look ahead.... not to a return to the life we knew before but to a 'new normal' where social distancing and a raft of health precautions will shape our Christian life together.

In our Gospel reading Jesus stirs us into new creative thinking about our life as the church in 'the new normal'.

In the first three verses, Jesus clearly understands that his mission was to glorify God and make God known in the world. How can we keep our focus on this primary purpose as the church? – to glorify God and make him known in the world?

We will only be able to meet together under difficult restrictions, but we have to remember that the point of our meeting is firstly to worship and glorify God, not as the branch of a social club. And to make God known in the world we will need to remember that our every conversation with our friends and neighbours carries a message about what is really important to us — is it self-focussed regret or God's loving care and purposes for us all?

In verse 6, Jesus shows he understands that the people he met, the people whose lives touched his, were each given to him by God. How will we respond in 'the new normal' to the people who are God's gift to us?

Are we ready to listen, to support, to encourage, to pray? To weep with those who weep and struggle with those who struggle? And at the same time can we recognise and nurture joy and hope when they spring forth anew? Each person is God's gift to us – and therefore infinitely precious and worthy of our time and care.

And then in verse 7, Jesus recognises that *everything* he was given in this world was given to him by God. Can we hold on to the truth that the church itself – the buildings, the money, the community of people – is given to us by God? It doesn't belong to us and God has a bigger purpose for the church than our own small ideas. Let's take this opportunity to let go of our possessive and controlling tendencies, and instead be more thankful, generous and outward looking as a church.

Jesus prays for us.... let's pray for each other as well. Let's pray that we might be people of worship, people who share God's love with others, people who value other people, people whose life together as the church is a message of hope to the world.
