

Brian Small: Last week we heard from his family that Brian Small had died, just six weeks after his wife Veronica. Brian, like Veronica, was a real fixture of the life of St Mary's and his contribution over the years was inestimable - he was a member of the PCC until just two years ago and his wise and perceptive counsel, mixed with a hint of mischief, was valued by all the recent vicars.

Brian had been unwell for a long time but seemed to have been successfully adjusting to a different life after a move to a local care home. After a short spell in hospital, Brian died at home surrounded by his family, just as he had wanted. Please remember Helen, Stephen and Judith in your prayers this week. Brian's funeral will be on Friday 14th August and we hope to hold a joint service of thanksgiving for him and Veronica in October. *Adrian*

JOSIE CHILDS: news of Josie, who is very unwell, comes from Gill Tordoff, who writes:

"I met Josie in 1973 and we have been good friends ever since. She was in the choir at St James Aylestone Park - since demolished .Josie became involved with St Mary's producing and helping put on productions with the children for many

years. Josie moved to Groby and being a non- driver found it difficult to keep up her connection with St Mary's. However, there are still members of the congregation who will remember her... Josie has lung cancer and has been in Glenfield hospital. She is now very unwell and is due to go home soon as no more treatment is viable.

The Leicester Lockdown - When will we start to re-open the church building?

Now that we can think again about re-opening our buildings, I thought it would be helpful for you to have some idea of the necessary steps in the process, even though putting dates to each is not very straightforward as it depends on the progress of the pandemic and on another discussion by the PCC:

- PCC meet to review risk assessments, agree dates and provisional pattern of services - completed
- spring clean the church ready for use Wednesday 2nd September (see below)
- open the church building for private prayer Sundays
 6th and 13th September
- PCC review re-opening so far 15th September
- open the church for Morning Prayer Sundays 20th and 27th September, 4th October
- PCC review re-opening so far 29th September
- provisionally set to open the church building for a service of Holy Communion on Sunday 11th October

Meanwhile we will continue to produce our Virtual Worship each week and of course the Newsletter will be emailed or posted out to everyone for whom we have contact details and permission.

Can you help with spring cleaning? As you'll see we are aiming to smarten up the inside of the building on the morning of Wednesday 2nd September, starting about 9.30am. Everyone is welcome to join me! Volunteers should bring a face covering and gloves, please. There is no need for special cleaning materials as there is no reason to think that the church has any virus contamination. Obviously, many hands will make light work, but please don't think about coming along if you are in a 'vulnerable group'. You can just turn up on the day but if you already know that you can come then do please let me know ahead. Thank you!

Collect & Reading for the Ninth Sunday of Trinity

The Collect

Almighty God, who sent your Holy Spirit to be the life and light of your Church: open our hearts to the riches of your grace, that we may bring forth the fruit of the Spirit in love and joy and peace; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Romans 10:5-15

⁵Moses writes concerning the righteousness that comes from the law, that 'the person who does these things will live by them.' ⁶But the righteousness that comes from faith says, 'Do not say in your heart, "Who will ascend into heaven?"' (that is, to bring Christ down) ⁷'or "Who will descend into the abyss?" (that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). ⁸But what does it say? 'The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart' (that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); ⁹because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. ¹⁰For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. ¹¹The scripture says, 'No one who believes in him will be put to shame.' ¹²For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. ¹³For, 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

¹⁴But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? ¹⁵And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written, 'How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!'

Matthew 14:22-33

Immediately after feeding the crowd with the five loaves and two fish, ²²Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. ²³And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, ²⁴but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. ²⁵And early in the morning he came walking towards them on the lake. ²⁶But when the disciples saw him walking on the lake, they were terrified, saying, 'It is a ghost!' And they cried out in fear. ²⁷But

immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, 'Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid.'

²⁸Peter answered him, 'Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water.' ²⁹He said, 'Come.' So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came towards Jesus. ³⁰But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, 'Lord, save me!' ³¹Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, 'You of little faith, why did you doubt?' ³²When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. ³³And those in the boat worshipped him, saying, 'Truly you are the Son of God.'

9th August - Matthew 14. 22-33 Reflective Questions for you to think about:

The passage begins with 'immediately' - what is it that has come just before and why do you think Jesus now wants to pray alone?

The disciples fear seems to stop them from recognising Jesus. What gets in the way of your faith? Is it fear, anxiety, envy, anger - or something else?

If you want to walk on water, you've got to get out of the boat'!' Is there something you really want to be able to do at the moment? Where is God calling you to 'get out of the boat'?

A Theophany...Scene 2! Revd Canon Dr Stephen Foster

Reflecting on the Gospel reading from Matthew today, my mind went immediately to my first time on stage as an operatic soloist. Nothing staggering, but singing Sir Roderick Murgatroyd in the G and S Opera Ruddigore as a debutant of 17 years of age...well...no singing coach by my side...all the other ghostly Murgatroyds providing a chorus to my star song, whilst each also desperately wanting to sing my part instead of me...an

awkward stage entry and the huge figure of my father, (always my severest critic,) sitting in the third row on opening night.

I felt very alone, very nervous and yet compelled to 'jump in' and simply 'do it'.

The disciples in this present story were compelled by Jesus to 'go it alone' in a boat on a journey from one side of the Sea of Galilee to the other. Although this is not a storm as in the similar Scene 1... Matthew 8:23-27, the huge difference is that here the disciples are alone being battered for a considerable length of time, and at night.

Jesus also is alone...referred to twice in the text ... but away from his followers on a mountain praying.

Combined with each being afraid enough, the last entity the disciples would wish to see is what they assume to be a ghost walking on the water towards them, walking on the primeval chaos which underpins this 'second scene' relating a similar story.

Here though, Jesus, using the 'I am' name for God Himself, tells them not to be afraid and in Peter not to avoid the turmoil, but to jump into it!

Here in this Theophany, this meeting of heaven and earth...(cf. Job 9:8, and Psalm 89:9) the first scene of the earlier Chapter 8 is now ramped up into showing beyond doubt that Jesus is God, and Lord of all creation.

Here too is the confirmation that we each can find Jesus in all the turmoil's of life and when we feel most alone. Likewise, we need to consciously step into the turmoil's, and take them on, rather than trying to avoid them, and there we will feel Jesus taking our hand and others will recognise the Lord in the chaos which temporarily abounds.

Collect & Reading for the Tenth Sunday of Trinity

The Collect

Let your merciful ears, O Lord, be open to the prayers of your humble servants; and that they may obtain their petitions make them to ask such things as shall please you; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Romans 11: 1-2a, 29-32

¹I ask, then, has God rejected his people? By no means! I myself am an Israelite, a descendant of Abraham, a member of the tribe of Benjamin. ²God has not rejected his people whom he foreknew. ²⁹For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable. ³⁰Just as you were once disobedient to God but have now received mercy because of their disobedience, ³¹so they have now been disobedient in order that, by the mercy shown to you, they too may now receive mercy. ³²For God has imprisoned all in disobedience so that he may be merciful to all.

Matthew 15: (10-20) 21-28

¹⁰Then Jesus called the crowd to him and said to them, 'Listen and understand: ¹¹it is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but it is what comes out of the mouth that defiles.' ¹²Then the disciples approached and said to him, 'Do you know that the Pharisees took offence when they heard what you said?' ¹³He answered, 'Every plant that my heavenly Father has not planted will be uprooted. ¹⁴Let them alone; they are blind guides of the blind. And if one blind person guides another, both will fall into a pit.' ¹⁵But Peter said to him, 'Explain this parable

to us.' ¹⁶Then he said, 'Are you also still without understanding? ¹⁷Do you not see that whatever goes into the mouth enters the stomach, and goes out into the sewer? ¹⁸But what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. ¹⁹For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness, slander. ²⁰These are what defile a person, but to eat with unwashed hands does not defile.'

²¹Jesus went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. ²²A Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, 'Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon.' ²³But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, 'Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us.' ²⁴He answered, 'I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel.' ²⁵But she came and knelt before him, saying, 'Lord, help me.' ²⁶He answered, 'It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs.' ²⁷She said, 'Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table.' ²⁸Then Jesus answered her, 'Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish.' And her daughter was healed instantly.

16th August - Matthew 15. 22-28 Reflective Questions for you to think about:

Why didn't Jesus answer this woman at first? What was her response and the disciples response to Jesus' 'silence'?

Be honest with yourself— do you tend to think of some types of people as more 'acceptable' to God or the church than some others? Have you any idea why?

How much faith do you think people should have before we welcome them into our church life?
