Collect & Readings for Candlemas

The Collect

Almighty and ever-living God, clothed in majesty, whose beloved Son was this day presented in the Temple, in substance of our flesh: grant that we may be presented to you with pure and clean hearts, by your Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading: Malachi 3.1-5

Thus says the Lord God: ¹See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight – indeed, he is coming, says the LORD of hosts. ²But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears? For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; ³he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the LORD in righteousness. ⁴Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the LORD as in the days of old and as in former years.

⁵Then I will draw near to you for judgement; I will be swift to bear witness against the sorcerers, against the adulterers, against those who swear falsely, against those who oppress the hired workers in their wages, the widow, and the orphan, against those who thrust aside the alien, and do not fear me, says the LORD of hosts.

Psalm 24.(1-6) 7-10

Second Reading: Hebrews 2.14-18

Luke 2.22-40

When the time of their purification according to the Law of Moses had been completed, Joseph and Mary took him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male is to be consecrated to the Lord"), and to offer a sacrifice in keeping with what is said in the Law of the Lord: "a pair of doves or two young pigeons".

Now there was a man in Jerusalem called Simeon, who was righteous and devout. He was waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. It had been revealed

to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Christ. Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying:

"Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you now dismiss your servant in peace. For my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all people, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel."

The child's father and mother marvelled at what was said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, his mother: "This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be spoken against, so that the thoughts of many hearts will be revealed. And a sword will pierce your own soul too."

There was also a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was very old; she had lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, and then was a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped night and day, fasting and praying. Coming up to them at that very moment, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were looking forward to the redemption of Jerusalem.

When Joseph and Mary had done everything required by the Law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee to their own town of Nazareth. And the child grew and became strong; he was filled with wisdom, and the grace of God was upon him.

<u>Candlemas, then the return to "Ordinary Time" 2021...</u> Revd Matthew Gough

This time last year, I had the privilege of leading the Candlemas service at St Guthlac's. The Sunday nearest to February 2nd, the time we mark as traditionally the end of Christmas. The baby Jesus is dedicated at the temple and the medieval church tradition of bringing your old candles to be melted down and replaced with new candles, new light going forth from the church. I remember well that we re-enacted Luke 2 with Anna and Simeon receiving the new-born saviour. Brenda Lee was a very convincing Anna. The children decorated glass jars which were beautiful as they held tea-light and flickered with warm yellow light on the altar.

Candlemas marks the return of Ordinary Time. What does ordinary mean anymore? It seems too strange that a year ago, we knew of this distant threat of Corona Virus in a far away country, gradually getting nearer. Soon the coverage of Italy and then Spain filled our screens with a warning that we were two weeks behind them. It was unreal and abstract as life was very ordinary in February 2020 England. Chris Whitty and Zoom were not the household names they are today with most of us having heard of neither.

I was looking forward to Ordinary Time 2021 (perhaps a bit superficially) as it would have been the first time, I get to wear my new green stole decorated in sunflowers. The sunflowers were inspired by my friend Sophie's artwork of a field of sunflowers which hang in our dining area. Sophie felt convicted by God to paint a sunflower field after seeing the infamous footage of Alan Kurdi. Who was Alan Kurdi? We probably have all seen his image. Tragically, he was the Syrian refugee three-year-old boy drowned in the Mediterranean trying to cross to the Greek island of Kos. His facedown image is a haunting

indictment on our world's failing systems and conflicts which destroy the most vulnerable.

The sunflowers are a really fitting image as they merge into one in unity and as the sunflowers follow the sun as the earth rotates around the sun, so we are reminded of our place in the light of Christ and our need to keep our eyes focused on him. Sunflowers also remind me personally of my deceased mother. Whilst walking late summer with my sister, I told her about my planned stole design, and she reminded me of our mother's love of sunflowers. As we were talking, we turned into the next field which happened to be a field full of sunflowers. We felt like this was God being with us, validating the plan, the cosmos responding in a strange and mysterious way. Or am I just being over-imaginative?

Alan Kurdi puts into perspective our fears and terrors which can be nothing compared to him and his family capsizing in the darkness of night on the Mediterranean Sea. Following the light of Christ like my sunflowers and taking the light from the temple compels us all that we must share the light and eternal hope that we have in Christ. We are struggling, many are struggling. How much harder it must be without faith. Can we share the light beyond ourselves? Be encouraged- a reminder for us and others...We are not alone (Isaiah 43; Matt 28). Death is not the end (John 3). There is a life beyond this one in the light (Revelation 21) of love (Romans 8) in our Father's house (John 14).
