

# **UPDATE:** Re-opening St Guthlac's for Sunday Worship

At our recent PCC meeting we confirmed our plans for reopening the church building for Sunday worship when the right time comes, in other words delaying until after the move to Step 3 of the Government's Roadmap, due on 17<sup>th</sup> May, all being well.

Our own 'roadmap' therefore looks like this (God willing):

13<sup>th</sup> May – checking over the building

16<sup>th</sup> May – church cleaning (see separate notice)

23<sup>rd</sup> May – Morning Prayer 10.30am (Church Club by Zoom)

30<sup>th</sup> May – Morning Prayer 10.30am

6<sup>th</sup> June – Eucharist 10.30am

13<sup>th</sup> June – Morning Prayer 10.30am

20<sup>th</sup> June – Eucharist 10.30am

27<sup>th</sup> June – Morning Prayer/ Church Club 10.30am

We will need to use the same booking system as before for the time being, and singing is still not permitted, but as soon as Government and Church of England guidance allows then we will restore the familiar features of our worship together.

In the meantime, the larger and more spacious building of St Mary's is now able to be used for Sunday worship, albeit with all the restrictions that you would expect. Services will follow the usual pattern (please see below) and everyone is welcome - but please do note the change in service times and the need to 'book' a place by phoning the Church Office (0116 2702705). *Adrian*

## **Collect & Readings for the Sixth Sunday of Easter**

#### The Collect

God our redeemer, you have delivered us from the power of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of your Son: grant, that as by his death he has recalled us to life, so by his continual presence in us he may raise us to eternal joy; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord. Amen

### First reading: Acts 10.44-48

<sup>44</sup>While Peter was speaking, the Holy Spirit fell upon all who heard the word. <sup>45</sup>The circumcised believers who had come with Peter were astounded that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out even on the Gentiles, <sup>46</sup>for they heard them speaking in tongues and extolling God. Then Peter said, <sup>47</sup>Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people who have received the Holy Spirit just as we have? <sup>48</sup>So he ordered them to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ. Then they invited him to stay for several days.

#### Psalm 98

Second reading: 1 John 5.1-6

Gospel reading: John 15.9-17

Jesus said to his disciples: <sup>9</sup>'As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. <sup>10</sup>If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. <sup>11</sup>I have said

these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete.

<sup>12</sup> This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. <sup>13</sup>No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. <sup>14</sup>You are my friends if you do what I command you. <sup>15</sup>I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. <sup>16</sup>You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. <sup>17</sup>I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.'

## A reflection on John 15.9-17 "What's love got to do with it?"

Tina Turner once famously announced, with a voice that I can't transcribe to paper, "What's love got to do with it? What's love but a second-hand emotion?" -in her 1984 hit song of the same title. I imagine Jesus giving her a wistful smile and then replying "Come and sit down Tina ... let me tell you something...."

Today's Gospel shows us that Tina Turner and Jesus have quite different understandings of love. Jesus might even quote Rowan Williams, the former Archbishop of Canterbury, to her: "Love is a long-term commitment to the welfare of another, usually at some cost to the giver."

Our English language suffers, of course, by only having the one word to describe love in all it's different facets and forms. Overwhelmingly, we embrace the *romantic* meaning on the

occasions that we hear the word 'love', and so we face some difficult problems for the credibility of the Christian faith in today's world. If love is soft, cuddly and surrounded by hearts and flowers, what has a Jesus who talks about love got to do with the realities of suffering and hardship in our daily lives?

Love. It would probably be futile to search for an alternative English word that carries anything like the same weight of meaning and is easy to understand correctly. It would be clumsy to attempt to amplify the word with extra descriptors when Jesus uses it, just to contrast with pop songs.

So we remain with the challenge of continually explaining that Christian 'love' is not pop-song 'love', or Valentine's Day 'love', or the 'love' of ice cream or beautiful scenery or chihuahuas.

I wonder if this might actually be a good thing. When we read a passage like John 15 we know that we have to face the words head on if we are to understand it properly. To explain it, to ourselves and to others, we have to dig into the true meaning of love, look at it closely in the cruel, bright light of day. We all know that we can't hide behind romantic notions of love – that would just make Jesus sound absurd. To look this closely at the real meaning of love is a powerful thing.

Today, what strikes me from this challenging exercise is that the love Jesus calls us to show to each other, is exactly the same love that he has shown himself, towards us.

Long term? Certainly: "For he chose us in him before the creation of the world" (Ephesians 1.4)

Commitment? Absolutely: "though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor" (2 Corinthians 8.9)

For our welfare? Exactly: "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." (John 10.10)

At cost to himself? Clearly: "But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5.8)

I'm challenged to consider if my love for you is for the long-term – or just while I am getting something in return.

I'm challenged to consider if my love for you is a whole-hearted commitment – or am I holding something back?

I'm challenged to consider if my love is about ensuring the best for you – or simply the things that make me feel good too?

I'm challenged to consider if my love for you is at all costly – or do I settle for a bargain version?

Jesus calls us to love each other exactly as he loves us. That's 'each other', as in: people we don't like, people we disagree with, people who are different, people who hurt us, people we are jealous of, people who feel far away ..... oh, and the other people in our churches too. And beyond of course.

But God doesn't leave us to do this alone.

St Paul was convinced that as God *calls* us to love, then he would also *help* us to love: "May the Lord direct your hearts into God's love and Christ's perseverance." (1 Thessalonians 3.5).

St John knew that becoming like Jesus in every way is the key to a life of love: "Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in them. This is how love is made complete among us .... in this world we are like Jesus." (1 John 4.16-17)

As Tina sang elsewhere, it's a love that's "simply the best."

## More about the Eco Church Scheme

Many of you will have read Fiona's address "Let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action" in last week's newsletter, in which she explained that the PCC has approved a new Environmental Strategy for St Guthlac's. The aim of this is to encourage our whole church family to show love for all of God's creation not only by changing our habits and lifestyles to reduce our impact on the world, but also by working together with people locally and more widely to bring about the changes needed to help those most affected by climate change. The Eco Church scheme provides a manageable, stepwise approach to what might otherwise seem the daunting task of reviewing 'where we are now' and deciding what action we need to take. A group of interested individuals has been formed to start work on this and to liaise with the PCC and a group from St Mary's. The first step will be to look at what we are already doing in five areas in order to identify priorities for change.
