Re-opening St Guthlac's for Sunday Worship

At our recent PCC meeting we confirmed our plans for reopening the church building for Sunday worship when the right time comes, in other words delaying until after the move to Step 3 of the Government's Roadmap, on 17th May.

Our own 'roadmap' therefore looks like this (God willing):

13th May – checking over the building (completed)

16th May – church cleaning (see separate notice) **TODAY!**

23rd May – Morning Prayer 10.30am (Church Club by Zoom)

30th May – Morning Prayer 10.30am

6th June – Eucharist 10.30am

13th June – Morning Prayer 10.30am

20th June – Eucharist 10.30am

27th June – Morning Prayer/ Church Club 10.30am

We will need to use the same booking system as before for the time being, and singing is still not permitted, but as soon as Government and Church of England guidance allows then we will restore the familiar features of our worship together.

In the meantime, the larger and more spacious building of St Mary's is now able to be used for Sunday worship, albeit with all the restrictions that you would expect. Services will follow the usual pattern (please see below) and everyone is welcome - but please do note the change in service times and the need to 'book' a place by phoning the Church Office (0116 2702705). MORNING PRAYER SERVICE & BOOKING SYSTEM Sunday 23rd May 10:30am

St Guthlac's will be open for Morning Prayer Sunday 23rd May at 10.30.

In order to maintain social distancing, we have to limit the number of people who can attend each service; our current calculation is that we can seat 21 individuals, small households or 'bubbles' safely at any one time. This is sadly very limiting. Consequently, we need to use a booking system.

THE MORNING PRAYER SERVICE

Before the service

- Please arrive by 10.25 to allow time to direct you to your seat.
- When you arrive, you may have to queue for a while please maintain a distance of 2m from others.
- Please wear a face covering as you queue and all the time you are in the church we have some extras for those who cannot obtain their own.
- You will be welcomed and asked to sanitise your hands.
- The steward will ask you to give or check your contact details. The Steward only will write these down. These details will only be shared in the unlikely event that anyone develops symptoms. This is to protect everyone.
- You will be directed to a seat. Please sit only in this place as we need to maintain distances and reduce movement.
- Please note there are no toilets available.

The service



- You will find a service sheet, blue prayer book and red OCOFOL book with the day's readings and prayers on your chair.
- A member of the Benefice Team will lead the service.
- The choir is not able to lead us in worship and we can't sing any hymns.

After the service

- Leave your service sheet and book on your chair
- Please keep your distance from others as you leave and do not linger in the building sadly we can't offer refreshments.

- If you wish to leave a donation, please put it in the small box provided.
- You will be asked to sanitise your hands as you leave.

When we have all gone, the church building will remain unused for 72 hours to eliminate any virus.

If you should feel unwell with any of the symptoms of coronavirus in the two weeks following the service, as well as seeking medical advice, please leave a message with Adrian or Matthew.

Collect & Readings for the Seventh Sunday of Easter

The Collect

O God the King of glory, you have exalted your only Son Jesus Christ with great triumph to your kingdom in heaven: we beseech you, leave us not comfortless, but send your Holy Spirit to strengthen us and exalt us to the place where our Saviour Christ is gone before, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First reading: Acts 1.15-17, 21-26

¹⁵In those days Peter stood up among the believers (together the crowd numbered about one hundred and twenty people). He said, 16'Friends, the scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit through David foretold concerning Judas, who became a guide for those who arrested Jesus - 17 for he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry. ²¹So one of the men who have accompanied us throughout the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, ²²beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us - one of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection.' ²³So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. ²⁴Then they prayed and said, 'Lord, you know everyone's heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen 25 to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place.' ²⁶And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias; and he was added to the eleven apostles.

Psalm 1

Second reading: 1 John 5.9-13

Gospel reading: John 17.6-19

Jesus looked up to heaven and prayed: 6'Father, I have made vour name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. ⁷Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; 8 for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. 9I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. ¹⁰All mine are yours, and yours are mine; and I have been glorified in them. 11 And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one. ¹²While I was with them, I protected them in your name that you have given me. I guarded them, and not one of them was lost except the one destined to be lost, so that the scripture might be fulfilled. ¹³But now I am coming to you, and I speak these things in the world so that they may have my joy made complete in themselves. ¹⁴I have given them your word, and the world has hated them because they do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. 15I am not asking you to take them out of the world, but I ask you to protect them from the evil one. ¹⁶They do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. ¹⁷Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth. ¹⁸As you have sent me into the world, so I have sent them into the world. ¹⁹And for their sakes I sanctify myself, so that they also may be sanctified in truth.'

Restless and Ready? A reflection on John 17:6-19

A confession: I am one of those annoying people who finds it hard to settle down to just sitting and being. I need to have something to do. This means that it's not uncommon for restless me to walk into our living room half-way through a television programme, and, of course, find it impossible to pick up the threads of what's happening.

A similar experience awaits us when we look at only a small section of Jesus' teaching and prayer at the Last Supper, as described in John's Gospel. For almost five chapters Jesus talks, and when we take just a small part of the much longer whole, we are bound to get only a partial understanding.

So, let's remind ourselves what Jesus is doing during these critical hours on the last night before his death. He starts by demonstrating what it means to follow in his way of serving others, but also highlights the opposition that follows. Again, he encourages his disciples to follow him and promises the Holy Spirit to help them. He urges his friends to love each other and again warns them that the road ahead is tough. He talks of grief and joy.... and then he *prays* for his disciples.

This is where today's Gospel passage fits in. Jesus prays for the protection of the disciples in the face of the challenges and pressures of the world, and he prays that they will be 'sanctified'. This is not a word that we use elsewhere or feel familiar with, but it just describes the process of becoming more and more of the people we have been created to be, more and more like Jesus himself - and it's the work of God.

Critically Jesus prays "Sanctify them by the truth; your word is truth." In this one sentence he draws together the themes that have been so strong in everything else that he's said here; the importance of following him closely, the protection his disciples need, the key place of love, and God's continued presence with them.

Knowing that this is their best future, Jesus prays that they may become more like God. Knowing the source of that change, he prays that they may be soaked in the truth that is found in God's word; the word revealed in flesh is Jesus himself, the word revealed in scripture is the Bible.

So, if this is what Jesus wants for his disciples, both then and now, surely we should be doing what we can to see it happen in our own life. We can be *intentional* about following the way of Jesus – making it our purpose and priority day by day. We can *choose and plan* to spend time with the Bible day by day. This is our part in God's work of sanctification, transformation, of ourselves – and also our part in God's work of transformation in the world.

If, like me, you feel restless and ready to do something positive, then this is the place to start.

For Sunday 9th May, a livestream will be broadcast on St Mary's Facebook page for the 10.30 available later service and on the www.stmarvsknighton.co.uk. If successful, we hope to offer live streaming at St Guthlac's too. This will complement the inperson and pre-recorded services.

PLANNED GIVING SCHEME

The period between Ascension and Pentecost has long been recognised as a time of prayer for the coming of the Holy Spirit. In more recent years, this has grown in prominence as "Thy Kingdom Come".

Just as last year, it's unlikely that the usual mass gatherings and worship which are part of TKC will be able to happen. In 2020, TKC completely changed shape, yet at its heart it remained the same: praying for people to know the love of Jesus Christ. Despite the restrictions, people from more than 90% of the world's countries took part, with new countries including Chad, Cuba and the Maldives. Christians from across many traditions, denominations and ages were involved. Testimonies were reported of people coming to faith and churches, families and individuals being drawn closer to God, being reinvigorated in their prayer life and inspired to share their faith. 'Thy Kingdom Come under Lockdown' resources were produced to enable churches, families and individuals to pray and worship in their homes suitable for use worldwide. Most of these resources were digital, including a popular Digital Family Prayer Adventure Map and App to explore prayer in a fun way. Thousands across the world signed up to shine their light on the

Thousands across the world signed up to shine their light on the Thy Kingdom Come website too. The 'Pray for five' (to come to faith) element of the campaign was reinforced. And in response to the crisis, a new theme, 'Prayer and Care', was introduced encouraging Christians to move beyond prayer into action,

practically demonstrating love and care through service to others during this time.
