THE SERVICE

Before the service

- Please arrive by 10.25 to allow time to direct you to your seat.
- When you arrive, you may have to queue for a while please maintain a distance of 2m from others.
- Please wear a face covering as you queue and all the time you are in the church - we have some extras for those who cannot obtain their own.
- You will be welcomed and asked to sanitise your hands.
- The steward will ask you to give or check your contact details. The Steward only will write these down. These details will only be shared in the unlikely event that anyone develops symptoms. This is to protect everyone.
- You will be directed to a seat. Please sit only in this place as we need to maintain distances and reduce movement.
- Please note there are no toilets available.

The service

- You will find the relevant book(s) and/or service sheet with the day's readings and prayers on your chair.
- A member of the Benefice Team will lead the service.
- The choir is not able to lead us in worship and we can't sing any hymns.

For Eucharist services:

The sharing of the bread or blessing

 Great care will be taken to protect the safety of the congregation. Only the priest will handle the elements and vessels, and then only after sanitising their hands. There will be no assistant. The wafers for the congregation will be covered while the priest consecrates them.

- After the priest takes his/her wine and priest's wafer, he/she will put on a mask and sanitise hands again. Only then will the small individual wafers be uncovered and given to the congregation. Only wafers will be offered, not wine. At the distribution, Holy Communion will be administered in silence.
- <u>Please stay in your seats</u> the celebrant will come out to you in turn.
- If you wish to receive the bread, please hold out your hands. The priest will 'drop' the wafer into the outstretched hands, taking care not to touch them.
- There is no obligation to take the bread. If you wish to receive a blessing, please hold up your service booklet. If you prefer to pray quietly and not to receive either please fold your arms.

After the service

- Leave your service sheet and books on your chair.
- Please keep your distance from others as you leave and do not linger in the building - sadly we can't offer refreshments.
- If you wish to leave a donation, please put it in the small box provided.
- You will be asked to sanitise your hands as you leave.

When we have all gone, the church building will remain unused for 72 hours to eliminate any virus.

If you should feel unwell with any of the symptoms of coronavirus in the two weeks following the service, as well as seeking medical advice, please leave a message with Adrian or Matthew.

Collect & Readings for the second Sunday after Trinity

The Collect

Lord, you have taught us that all our doings without love are nothing worth: send your Holy Spirit and pour into our hearts that most excellent gift of love, the true bond of peace and of all virtues, without which whoever lives is counted dead before you. Grant this for your only Son Jesus Christ's sake, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First reading: Ezekiel 17.22-24

²²Thus says the Lord God: I myself will take a sprig from the lofty top of a cedar; I will set it out. I will break off a tender one from the topmost of its young twigs; I myself will plant it on a high and lofty mountain. ²³On the mountain height of Israel I will plant it, in order that it may produce boughs and bear fruit, and become a noble cedar. Under it every kind of bird will live; in the shade of its branches will nest winged creatures of every kind. ²⁴All the trees of the field shall know that I am the LORD. I bring low the high tree, I make high the low tree; I dry up the green tree and make the dry tree flourish. I the LORD have spoken I will accomplish it.

Psalm 92.1-4, 12-15

Second reading: 2 Corinthians 5.6-10(11-13)14-17

Gospel reading: Mark 4.26-34

Such a large crowd gathered around Jesus that he got into a boat and began to teach them using many parables. ²⁶Jesus said, 'The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, ²⁷and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. ²⁸The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. ²⁹But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come.'

³⁰Jesus also said, 'With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? ³¹It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; ³²yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade.' ³³With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; ³⁴he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples.

Nesting birds and a broken Church

I miss the Wisteria plant I grew over my Wigston doorway. I loved its explosions of, albeit short-lived, riots of indigo blossoms. We also enjoyed welcoming each spring a nesting couple of wood pigeons who would turn up like clockwork and stay until their chicks hatched early summer. I liked to imagine them as the previous year's chicks returning to use our frontage as their seasonal AirBnB. On the flip side, if you have ever tried to grow fruit or vegetables then such nearby nesting birds become your nemesis. On my unsuccessful allotment, I would battle the slugs, frost, mice, weeds and insects only for my pathetic brassicas to be demolished by divebombing kamikaze

birds despite my best Wurzel Gummidge creations failing to convince even the most timid of crows.

In today's Ezekiel and gospel reading there can be ambiguity in understanding the role of birds in the garden as either, or both, a sign of the rich prosperity of God's blessing **and** a threat of destructive menace. In Ezekiel, the eagles inhabit and move trees around apparently in opposition to God's will. These are representative of Israel's rival colonial powers (Egypt and Babylon) oppressing God's people. Though when God chooses to grow a cedar from a sprig it becomes inhabited by 'every kind of bird'. This parallels with the growth of the kingdom in Mark's gospel as illustrated by the tapestry in St Guthlac's-the fruitful tree holding the nests of the birds of the air.

Some scholars have come down on the side of the birds being a threat in Mark's gospel. How, when God's kingdom expands-such growth will always attract destructive and unwelcome inhabitants, like Emperor Constantine. The contemporary theological consensus seems to be, that Constantine in the late fourth century adopting Christianity as the official religion of the Roman Empire, has been the most destructive wrong turn the Church took which it still suffers from. Where kingdom was exchanged for empire. Christians came out of the dungeons of Rome to occupy its palaces. The vestments priests wear today resemble more the robes of Roman courtiers than the rags of the itinerant Jesus of Galilee and his disciples. The church, too easily wooed by the trappings of wealth, status and power cannot hold onto its prophetic purposes whilst embedded in the very fabrics of the ruling elite.

And today, are we at such a pivotal turning point? As a Church of England and even Leicester Diocese considers its position as financially it cannot meet its current obligations. "We have a

church on its knees?" Broken, vulnerable, uncertain, lacking control of the future. A church on its knees...but isn't this more likely where we should be? Our prayer kneelers were never intended to be comfortable cushions.

Not putting our faith in financial security, order, and hierarchy, can we embrace a vulnerable church and live? Flourish more? Be Ezekiel's smaller green sprig dependent on God's grace and mercy? On our knees. Finding strength through a welcome home for all? Rather than wishing to be the powerful eagle, instead the gentle dove our spiritual role model. On our knees, where we meet a vulnerable and broken saviour.

Let us be discerning and wise about our 'nesting birds'. Are they the vulnerable in need of shelter, or the deceptive vultures of comfort, security and ultimately death?

Eco-Tip of the week



Let's talk toilet rolls!

Not long ago when toilet rolls were in short supply, it was a matter of getting your hands on whatever kind you were lucky enough to see on sale! With the luxury of choice restored, what should you take into account when shopping for toilet roll: Price? Softness/Quilting?? Sustainability???

Thing to consider:

- The growing trend for "luxury" four-ply and quilted toilet roll is apparently fuelling the use of virgin wood pulp in an effort to create the softest product. Maybe we have travelled rather too far from the IZAL!
- Recycled toilet paper may be less luxurious, but after all, loo roll is the ultimate single use product!
- If a brand carries the label 'FSC Mix' then it will be made using virgin wood pulp
- Bamboo if responsibly sourced, is more sustainable than virgin pulp. Look for the FSC stamp
- Is it wrapped in plastic? Go for unpackaged toilet roll (loose in a box) or one with biodegradable or at least recyclable wrapper if possible
- Is it made in the UK thus avoiding unnecessary transportation?

Brands to consider:



Most supermarkets offer an own brand 100% recycled toilet roll for starters.

If you'd like to take a further step, there are now a number of independent brands with great sustainability credentials. Some even support good causes such as funding sanitation overseas (e.g., Who Gives a C**P). Why not check them out? Bishop's urgent appeal for Covid-19 aid in Leicester's Indian link diocese

Bishop Martyn is asking for urgent financial support for our partners in India. We are hoping to help them purchase a new ambulance, oxygen concentrators, a ventilator and other equipment costing a total of £80,000. Details of how to contribute are given below.

The Bishop of our partner diocese, Trichy-Tanjore in the Church of South India (CSI), has written to describe the response of Christians in their region to the Covid-19 crisis which is sweeping India with devastating effect. Cases of infection have been increasing day by day and hospitals are short of beds, oxygen supplies and medication to treat the symptoms of Covid and other infections to which people, weakened by the virus, are falling prey. With the country in lockdown, schools and colleges are shut and people in many places are literally starving for lack of access to food. Regrettably, many church members, including two pastors in the diocese, have died and many more are in hospital receiving treatment.

In spite of all this, the Church is taking lot of effort and organizing relief work in partnership with Bishop Heber College in Trichy. The 'Task Force against Covid 19' works day and night to coordinate information about hospital bed availability, oxygen, food, ambulance services, counselling, prayer support, financial support, plasma availability and support for funerals. There has been a good response from the community for which they are very grateful to God.

The Diocese has come forward to open food counters in each local church where food packets are kept at the entrance of the

church for people who are hungry and needy to take. Facilities at the two CSI Mission Hospitals in the Diocese, in Trichy and Dharapuram have been dedicated for the treatment of Covid Patients and work is in hand to increase the number of beds available.
