This Sunday Revd Janet Gasper will be presiding and preaching at a service of Holy Communion.

COVID SAFETY AT SERVICES AT ST GUTHLAC'S

Although the Government has said there will be no restrictions on communal worship after 19th July, the National Church of England has urged a cautious approach. Therefore we are planning to make limited changes only for the next few weeks.

Masks & social distancing

While face masks and social distancing are not mandatory, we recommend that you use them, unless you have an exemption. Hand sanitiser will be available for you to use as you enter and leave the church.

Booking and contact details

You will not need to book a place beforehand. However we need to have details of who attends. In order to minimise touching of the attendance list, we will have an alphabetic register of people who have regularly been coming to church in the last 2 months as we have contact details for these people. It will be easy and quick for the steward to tick these names. People who are not on the list will be asked to give their name and contact details.

Choose where you feel comfortable to sit

The church will be set up with rows at the front of the church and spread out seats at the back. You can choose where you feel most comfortable to sit. You will be offered cards saying 'Covid Safety, Please do not sit on this chair'. You can put them on your adjoining chair if you wish to guarantee that others will not sit immediately next to you.

Toilets

Toilets will be open. Please use hand sanitiser before and after entering the toilet.



Singing will be allowed. Please use a mask

Singing will be allowed. The Church of England recommend that precautions should be taken to reduce transmission of the virus by using masks and shortening the duration of an activity like singing. Therefore please wear a mask while singing. If you don't have a mask, please don't sing.

For Eucharist services: The sharing of the bread or blessing

- Only the priest will handle the elements and vessels, and then only after sanitising their hands. There will be no assistant. The wafers for the congregation will be covered while the priest consecrates them.
- After the priest takes his/her wine and priest's wafer, he/she will put on a mask and sanitise hands again. Only then will the small individual wafers be uncovered and given to the congregation. Only wafers will be offered, not wine. At the distribution, Holy Communion will be administered in silence.
- Please stay in your seats the celebrant will come out to you in turn.

- If you wish to receive the bread, please hold out your hands. The priest will 'drop' the wafer into the outstretched hands, taking care not to touch them.
- There is no obligation to take the bread. If you wish to receive a blessing, please hold up your service booklet. If you prefer to pray quietly and not to receive either please fold your arms.

Food and drink will not be served after the service in order to protect people who might serve and clear up afterwards. This will be reviewed after a few weeks.

Donations

If you wish to leave a donation, please put it in the small box provided.

When we have all gone, the church building will remain unused for at least 48hours hours to eliminate any virus. The church and



toilet will be cleaned regularly as normal.

If you should feel unwell with any of the symptoms of coronavirus in the two weeks following the service, as well as seeking medical advice, please leave a message with Adrian or Matthew.

Collect & Readings for the Blessed Virgin Mary

The Collect

Almighty God, who looked upon the lowliness of the Blessed Virgin Mary and chose her to be the mother of your only Son: grant that we who are redeemed by his blood may share with her in the glory of your eternal kingdom; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Psalm 45.10-17

Second reading: Galatians 4.4-7

Gospel reading: Luke 1.46-55

⁴⁶ My soul magnifies the Lord, ⁴⁷ and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour, ⁴⁸ for he has looked with favour on the lowliness of his servant. Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; ⁴⁹ for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. ⁵⁰ His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation. ⁵¹ He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts. ⁵² He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; ⁵³ he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty. ⁵⁴ He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy, ⁵⁵ according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants for ever.'

Reflection for August 15th The Blessed Virgin Mary Rev Janet Gasper

The main celebration for the Blessed Virgin Mary's on August 15th, but she can be celebrated on September 8th (her birth), December 8th (her conception). March 25 celebrates The Annunciation of our Lord to the Blessed Virgin Mary and on May 31st it is the Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth her cousin.

The gospel for August 15th is Mary's main response to the news that she is to be the mother of Jesus. We call it "Magnificat", now used as a Canticle at Evening Prayer, it is the gospel before the gospel - a bright shout of triumph. It is not a carefully constructed poem, it is Mary's response to God ,to Jesus who has only just been conceived and Mary is full of excitement and hope.

The song starts with God, calling up the past and reflecting on the future. It is rooted in the Jewish dream that one day, God through the people of Israel would bless all nations. Mary's song is full of quotations from the psalms which speak of mercy, hope, fulfilment, victory over evil and God coming to the rescue at last. Much of Mary's song is echoed by the preaching and actions of her son - stories of God feeding the people in the Old Testament are paralleled by Jesus feeding the crowds on the hillside. Jesus warns the rich not to trust exclusively in their wealth, invites us all to sit lightly to material things and reallocates our treasure in the love, peace and joy we share with God and one another. Mary's song invites us to be warm hearted and generous reversing the values of our society. How much we need this song in the madness and sadness of life today.

God chose in Mary an ordinary young women. She has to learn to be patient, to let go and trust God for her son's well-being. She has to stand aside and allow him to leave the family and put the needs of others first. She has to endure the grief of watching him die a horrible death and struggle with the meaning of it all. God's choice of Mary is part of the mystery of our faith. God saw someone who would respond in faith and love. We are all like Mary ,at best humble servants. It is God who equips ,empowers, strengthens us. Mary's song is a celebration of God.

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord My spirit rejoices in God my Saviour:

He has looked with favour on his lowly servant.

From this day all generations will call me blessed; The Almighty has done great things for me And holy is his name.

He has mercy on those who fear him' From generation to generation.

He has shown strength with his arm And has scattered the proud in their conceit.

Casting down the mighty from their thrones And lifting up the lowly.

He has filled the hungry with good things And sent the rich away empty.

He has come to the aid of his servant Israel To remember his promise of mercy

To Abraham and his children forever

Eco-Tip of the week



Energy saving in the kitchen

It doesn't matter whether you view cooking as a necessary evil or one of life's great pleasures, you'll spend some time each day in your kitchen. Major appliances like ovens, microwaves and fridge-freezers mean this single room is responsible for almost one-third of your household's total energy usage. Being mindful of our use of energy when preparing food can help reduce our carbon footprint as well as our energy bills. Suggested actions are:

Cover your pan with a lid, which will reduce the amount of energy required to boil water by 75%, and only use the minimum of water needed to cover the food

Only fill your kettle with the amount of water you actually need to boil

Use a tiered steamer so that all your veg can be cooked on one ring

Use your oven more efficiently by preparing more than one dish at a time

Use a slow cooker- one of the most energy-efficient appliances in the kitchen

Resist the temptation to open the oven door during cookingcheck progress through the window!

Use your microwave for simple reheating: Even the cheapest microwaves will usually be more efficient for this task

Keep your freezer full as it will be more efficient this way
