Collect and Readings for the Third Sunday before Advent

The Collect

Almighty Father, whose will is to restore all things in your beloved Son, the King of all: govern the hearts and minds of those in authority, and bring the families of the nations, divided and torn apart by the ravages of sin, to be subject to his just and gentle rule; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading: 1 Kings 17.8-16

The Widow of Zarephath

⁸Then the word of the LORD came to him, saying, ⁹ "Go now to Zarephath, which belongs to Sidon, and live there; for I have commanded a widow there to feed you." ¹⁰ So he set out and went to Zarephath. When he came to the gate of the town, a widow was there gathering sticks; he called to her and said, "Bring me a little water in a vessel, so that I may drink." ¹¹ As she was going to bring it, he called to her and said, "Bring me a

morsel of bread in your hand." ¹² But she said, "As the LORD your God lives, I have nothing baked, only a handful of meal in a jar, and a little oil in a jug; I am now gathering a couple of sticks, so that I may go home and prepare it for myself and my son, that we may eat it, and die." ¹³ Elijah said to her, "Do not be afraid; go and do as you have said; but first make me a little cake of it and bring it to me, and afterwards make something for yourself and your son. ¹⁴ For thus says the LORD the God of Israel: The jar of meal will not be emptied and the jug of oil will not fail until the day that the LORD sends rain on the earth." ¹⁵ She went and did as Elijah said, so that she as well as he and her household ate for many days. ¹⁶ The jar of meal was not emptied, neither did the jug of oil fail, according to the word of the LORD that he spoke by Elijah.

¹⁴After John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, ¹⁵and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news.'

Reflection for the Third Sunday before Advent

The jar of flour is not used up...and the jug of oil does not run dry.

It was autumn time.

Sally and Ruth were students in their third year of University in Minnesota. They were partners, loving each other dearly and living in a modest second floor flat not far from their own Humanities Faculty.

Downstairs lived an old man, William, who spent his days painting and selling what he did in the local store down the road. Sally and Ruth kept an eye on him and made sure he was looking after himself properly.

One day Ruth became very sick. She took to her bed at the back of the flat. The doctor was called several times but couldn't find anything wrong with her.

'I don't know what to say...' he said. 'There is nothing more I can do. She's not eating, not drinking much...I just don't understand it. She seems to have just given up.' Ruth seemed to get worse and worse, deteriorating in front of Sally's eyes.

Each morning, she opened Ruth's bedroom curtains. The bedroom looked out onto a small courtyard. A beautiful climbing plant with bright red leaves clung to the wall opposite Ruth's window. Sally tried to cheer her up commenting on how beautiful it was...but to no avail.

The leaves began to fall, and one morning on Sally opening the curtains, Ruth delivered a chilling prophecy. 'When the last leaf falls from that plant I will be no more.'

Sally was beside herself. She ran to the local surgery. On the way, Old William was the first person she met and told him of the latest news bursting into tears as he listened patiently.

Morning after morning Sally opened Ruth's curtains. The leaves seemed to bravely hang on to the branches, but inevitably they began to fall and in ever increasing numbers.

One morning, on opening Ruth's curtains there were just six leaves bravely clinging to the branches...the next morning four, the following morning two. Ruth always insisted Sally opened the curtains, and the following morning in fear and trepidation she opened the curtains. One sole beautiful red leaf remained.

The next morning she tried to put Ruth off.

But no...

'Please open the curtains Sally.' Ruth slowly did as she was asked, peeping round the curtain edge hoping against hope. The one leaf bravely remained...and it did the next day... and the next, and the next.

The jar of flour is not used up and the jug of oil does not run dry.

On seeing this one remaining leaf, this last hope, Ruth began to eat again, she began to cheer up and feel better. Eventually she got up, became stronger, and resumed her course at University.

After a few weeks Sally pulled back the curtains of Ruth's bedroom. To her amazement, although it was very very cold and frosty the one beautiful red leaf was still there.

She happened to bump into William at the corner shop. William had gladly heard of Ruth's recovery.

'I don't understand it she said... but Ruth is now just fine.

'The jar of flour is not used up and the jug of oil does not run dry.

'Come and see' he said. He led Sally to the yard at the back of their flats. There was a set of ladders, some paint brushes and paints.

'Painting a leaf onto a wall is not hard you know...and this leaf is one that is never going to fall off any branch to which it seems attached. But don't tell Ruth...let it be our little secret!'

We all have sufficient flour and oil...because as in the story of Elijah God equips us all. The equipping of our flour and our oil will never run-out because God is always faithful.

Therefore we all have leaves to paint. We all have leaves to paint, and, whoever we are, we have the means to paint them, and thereby we can bring life to others. We all have leaves to paint whatever the season, in places to be shown and at times to be discerned. All we need to do is to be faithful and leave the rest to God.

Eco-Tip of the week



Do we need cling film?

You wrap food in it. Mark Addy wrapped himself in it while eating Mars Bars in his shed in The Fully Monty. What else is there to know about clingfilm?

More than 1.2 billion metres, equating **to 745,000 miles** of cling film is used by households across Britain every year – enough to go around the circumference of the world 30 times over!

It is plastic, typically low-density polyethylene (LDPE) or linear low-density polyethylene (LLDPE).

It is also single use – and far less widely accepted for recycling than other common single-use plastic products, such as drinks bottles.

We managed to store food securely and safely before it became available!

Why not try these alternatives?



- Use an inverted plate or saucer to cover bowls or plates of food in the fridge
- Use lidded storage boxes (including your empty margarine tubs etc) in the fridge
- Try reusable wax wraps for wrapping sandwiches or to cover refrigerated food

It would be lovely to have your presence as a councillor, showing your support for this hugely important issue of climate justice.


We do plan to issue a press release beforehand, and hope there will be press there on the day, so if you are going to join us, would you please:
