The Collect

Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness and to put on the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which your Son Jesus Christ came to us in great humility; that on the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First reading: Jeremiah 33.14-16

¹⁴The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will fulfil the promise I made to the house of Israel and the house of Judah. ¹⁵In those days and at that time I will cause a righteous Branch to spring up for David; and he shall execute justice and

righteousness in the land. ¹⁶In those days Judah will be saved and Jerusalem will live in safety. And this is the name by which it will be called: 'The LORD is our righteousness.'

Rediscovering Advent, Reclaiming Christmas

We often complain about the way in which Christmas has become commercialised and the true meaning of our celebration has been lost. One important way to counter this trend and to make sure that we ourselves are keeping the focus in the right place, is to **rediscover Advent** as an important season of the year, and in its own right.

Advent marks the beginning of the Christian year and can be seen as a time of preparation in a similar way to Lent. The colour used in church changes to purple, as a sign of this 'work of the heart', the inward and spiritual preparation that we take on so as to be ready once again, for the celebration of Christ's birth.

This year Advent Sunday falls on 28th November and the benefice choir will be leading us in a special Advent Service in St Mary's at 6.30pm. This is the best possible way to begin the journey towards Christmas, so do please join us.

This year there will also be four weekly **Advent Meditations** open to everyone - each Tuesday, 7.30pm at St Guthlac's (31st November, then 7th, 14th and 21st December). Each will be hosted by a member of our Ministry Team and will provide 45-60 minutes of prayers, reflections and music to help us keep hold of Advent as the pressures of the holiday season begin to take over.

Our **Advent Fellowship Group** will also meet on three Thursday mornings at the Vicarage, 5 Church Lane -2^{nd} , 9^{th} and 16^{th} December from 10-11.30am. Each week we will be looking at some of the different names of Jesus from the Bible, and sharing stories, prayers and coffee & cake! Everyone is welcome but please sign up first by using the list at the back of

the church or by leaving a message on the Vicarage answerphone (0116 270 4268).

There are also many books and resources online to help you take a few minutes for **daily reflection and prayer** through Advent. You might like to take a look, for example, at the Archbishop of York's Advent Book for 2021 – "Music of Eternity: Meditations for Advent with Evelyn Underhill" by Robyn Wrigley-Carr - which comes highly recommended. It's available from Christian Resources at St Martin's House in the city centre (0116 261 5222).

Alternatively you might like to use a book that I have found particularly helpful: "Waiting here for you – an Advent journey of hope" by Louie Giglio. I have seven copies, each available for free or for a donation to Tearfund – just ask!

I hope you'll be able to rediscover Advent and so reclaim Christmas this year.

New Bishop of Loughborough announced.

The Queen has approved the nomination of the Reverend Malayil Lukose Varghese Muthalaly (known as Saju), as the new Suffragan Bishop of Loughborough. He succeeds the first-ever Bishop of Loughborough, the Right Revd Dr Guli Francis-Dehgani who became Bishop of Chelmsford earlier this year.



Bishop-elect Saju said: "It is an honour and a joy to be invited to become the next Bishop of Loughborough and I am looking forward to getting to know the people of Leicestershire.

"My priorities in ministry are profoundly relational. If I have felt anointed in anything, it

is in forming friendships, gathering God's people, and creating hospitable and loving spaces in which people can grow in faith, hope, justice and love.

"I have a deep desire for the flourishing of all people, particularly the poor, those at the margins of our world. I grew up in a leprosy hospital in the city of Bangalore, India, where my mother worked as a nurse. From my earliest memory, my heart has bent towards those who live in poverty."

For the last seven years, Bishop-elect Saju has been the vicar of St Mark's and St Mary's Island, Gillingham, in the Diocese of Rochester, Kent. He will be moving, with his wife and four children, to the diocese in the spring.

Bishop of Leicester, the Rt Revd Martyn Snow said: "We are delighted that Saju is coming to join us in the Diocese of Leicester where we cherish the wide diversity of our worshipping communities and are looking to strengthen parishes and help them do more with their local schools. We look forward to the energy and enthusiasm Saju brings, knowing that he will be a Bishop who is first and foremost a disciple committed to listening and learning as he joins us in our vision of seeking the Kingdom of God."

Fond Farewell: Last week we said a fond farewell to the Revd Canon Dr Stephen Foster who has supported the parishes of Knighton with his ministry for several years. There were many words of appreciation from Fiona Wingate and Revd Adrian Jones, and Stephen was presented with gifts from both parishes as a mark of our gratitude. Revd Canon Dr Stephen Foster's final sermon at St. Guthlac's, Sunday 21st November 2121

Quid est veritas?...or Ti estin aletheia?...or What is truth?

This verse (John 18.38) which immediately follows the Gospel reading for today is spoken by Pilate, in answer to our Lord saying that 'everyone that is of the truth hears my voice.'

Pilate answers...'What is truth?'

As a Roman following Greek thought Pilate was probably reflecting on the common idea that absolute truth is very hard if not impossible to pin down. In simple terms, when we think we have got something sorted, 'cast iron' and immutable, some new discovery comes along that asks us to think again. Sadly, for some, the alternative is to turn away from the discovery made, and 'bury their heads in the sand'.

So, Greek sceptics amongst others in the Classical world argued that an absolute final 'truth' could simply not be grasped. In our present age, the discoveries of science at least show us that in many ways the truths we learn today often supplant the things we thought to be true yesterday.

But, Aletheia the Greek word used by St John for 'truth' in the text literally means 'unconcealed', 'not hidden'.

On Jesus' lips, the use of 'aletheia' seems to indicate absolute revealed truth and knowledge related to his own person. He is the absolute truth of God Himself revealed gloriously in his own person. Yet even here, Pilate answers 'What is truth?'

Sadly, inspite of what Jesus says to him, Pilate remains in a fog, as a type of Roman sceptic...any truth for him and his like being (at the very least) hard to grasp, and in the person of Jesus impossible to recognise. Yet, for us Christians, Jesus stands before him and indeed us as the absolute revealed truth of God Himself. The irony is that such revealed absolute truth we find in Jesus 2000yrs later is totally lost on Pilate who

literally stands in front of Jesus at this very moment in the story. Pilate, despite all he is told, still answers... 'What is truth?'

A slight aside is that, this verse forms part of the earliest fragment we have of a New Testament text. It is a papyrus codex written on both sides, the size of a credit card. It was discovered in 1920 in Egypt, and dates somewhere between 125 and 175AD. (Some scholars, and I'm one if them, think this fragment is from as late as 200AD!) Therefore the fragment formed part of a copy of the Gospel which is at the very least one step removed from any autograph or 'original'. It is housed at Manchester University where I taught and have gazed on it lovingly many many times.

But, back to the main point. Pilate answers... 'What is truth?' Our conviction is that we believe that Jesus is truly the Son of God, that he lived and died and rose again.

I believe, with all my heart... and with all my head... that truth stands before us in Jesus Christ, that he lived, died and rose again.

Our reaction... my reaction to the realisation of such truth in my head and heart, is to do my best to love God with all my heart, soul, mind, and strength, and my neighbour as myself.

So you may be wondering...'If that's the case, Stephen...what is your problem? Why are you taking 'a step back'?'

Well, first of all, let me say that my problem is not with the wonderful people of St Mary's or St Guthlac's. I have been honoured to help in some small way in the Benefice over a number of years.

My problem stems from being a liberal, Anglo- Catholic, academic...a liberal Anglo-Catholic, academic. None of these are 'flavour of the month' in the present Church of England...indeed quite the reverse. I was told by a priest-friend who was a National Selector for Ordination, of which I used to be one myself...

'Stephen, you yourself would not be selected these days for Ordination.'

Pilate answers... 'What is truth?'

My problem, and I say this only for myself, 'me myself and I', is that the quest for ever greater truth in for example, biblical scholarship, my own much loved academic discipline, has, with other academic disciplines at the very least been 'put on the back burner' by the Church.

Secondly, the Anglican Church as defined by the 16th century scholar Richard Hooker where truth was ascertained through Scripture, Tradition and Reason, and now added to by Experience, is now largely set aside.

Thirdly, the Anglican Church which was a broad Church, sometimes uncomfortably, but still a broad Church, embracing different ecclesiologies under the same umbrella and serving the nation, has become much more of one type only. This broad Church with its national responsibility of a Parish Church serving a community is being stretched hugely.

Pilate answers...'What is truth?'

So for now, the truth is that I need to take a step back after nearly 44 years of ordained ministry as a Parish Priest, theologian, and musician. As a priest, I feel I need to return to my roots, think and pray, and see where the Lord leads... see what the Lord has in store for me under the guidance of the Holy Spirit... and move forward again from there.

Lastly, in every Parish/Cathedral/University of which I have been a part, and as in this Benefice, I truly believe the Lord puts wonderful wonderful folk in front of me and then says...'As my gift to you Stephen, learn from them.' He has done so here in his faithfulness.

I hope he carries on doing so, as this is part of what I understand to be, the privilege of priesthood.

Eco-Tip of the week



How to green your laundry habits

Laundry is one of those routine chores most of us do without even thinking about. Clothes, towels and bedding pile up. We throw them in the washer, slosh some detergent on top, then toss them in the dryer when they're done.



But laundry can make a **big** impact. There's the amount of water and energy it takes to run a washer and dryer. There's the impact of detergents on waterways and the plastic waste from laundry product containers and dryer sheets. And did you know that every time you wash fabrics made from synthetic materials (typically 60% of our laundry items) they shed countless microplastics that drain with the water and end up in rivers, lakes and the sea?

Here are some ways to reduce the environmental impact of doing your washing:

- Wash your clothes less often! This will extend the life of your clothes as well as saving energy and water. Use your eyes and nose to indicate whether an item really needs to be washed, and spot clean where this can avoid having to wash the entire garment. Hang clothes up to air after wearing rather than automatically putting them in the laundry basket after a single use.
- Wash full loads only and use a cool setting
- Air dry your laundry whenever you can
- Choose an eco-friendly detergent and try to avoid additional laundry products such as tumble drier sheets, softeners and scented ironing water which are heavily marketed but can be done without
- Choose natural fibres when buying new items
- Consider buying a mesh bag designed to catch microfibres (eg Guppyfriend Bag)


