"Doing Lent Gently" in 2022



Often Lent is seen as a rather harsh and certainly penitential part of church year we are touah on ourselves as preparation for the joy of Easter. This spirit of selfexamination. even criticism, and abstinence

has its place and can prove valuable – *however* – given that so much has already been sacrificed over the last two years, perhaps this Lent should be less about discipline and more about gentleness, with ourselves and each other.

A gentle Lent might help us draw closer to the gentle self-giving of Jesus himself, on his journey to the cross and beyond.

Here are a few suggestions for 'doing Lent gently':


Being still – choose a time each day when you can be still and just sit for a few minutes, either in silence with a five-minute timer, or listening, eyes closed, to a favourite gentle song;

Letting go – think of something that takes time but makes little difference to anyone else, and just let go of it until Easter.... it could be the time you spend on Facebook, watching a TV soap, painting your nails or polishing the car. You could use the time for catching up on something long postponed.

Simple giving – identify a simple thing you can give to others once a week (or more, if easier) ... it could be writing a postcard each weekend to send on Monday, putting flowers in your window, or letting someone go ahead of you in the shopping queue.

Join 'Difference' – this Lent, over five Wednesday evenings from 9th March, we are running 'Difference', a course (on Zoom) that equips Christians to cross divides, navigate disagreement and pursue a just and flourishing world. Through film, Bible study, prayer and discussion we are encouraged to develop the three habits of being curious, being present and reimagining – to build reconciliation and change in place of division. Get reading - follow up our Sunday series on women of the



Bible by reading "Women of Holy Week" by Paula Gooder. This is an imaginative retelling, in nine stories, of the events of the last days of Jesus through the eyes of the women accompanying him. We'll also have a special coffee morning to discuss the stories together, at 10am on Wednesday 6th April at the Vicarage. The Collect & Readings for the First Sunday in Lent

The Collect

Almighty God,

whose Son Jesus Christ fasted forty days in the wilderness, and was tempted as we are, yet without sin:

give us grace to discipline ourselves in obedience to your Spirit; and, as you know our weakness,

so may we know your power to save;

through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,

who is alive and reigns with you,

in the unity of the Holy Spirit,

one God, now and for ever.

Amen.

First Reading: Deuteronomy 26.1-11

Psalm 91.1-2,9-16

Second Reading: Romans 10.8b-13

Gospel reading: Luke 4.1-13

¹Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, ²where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. ³The devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread.' ⁴Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "One does not live by bread alone."

⁵Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. ⁶And the devil said to him, 'To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. ⁷If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours.' ⁸Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him."

⁹Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, ¹⁰for it is written, "He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you", ¹¹and "On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone."

¹²Jesus answered him, 'It is said, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test." ¹³When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time.

PRAYERS

As we begin this Lenten season, may we embrace a pilgrimage of the heart. As we see twisted broken and burning bomb sites in the Ukraine, may we see the ashes in our own lives. May we turn to Christ afresh. May we be encouraged by the spring of blossom and flowers bursting forth from bare branches and dull earth. May we seek in the cracks of the grey concrete pavements, the hints of God's Kingdom on earth being true, coming in part and still yet to come.

We pray for the people of Ukraine. We pray for the restoration of peace and safety. Jesus commanded us to pray for and love our enemies. As Putin has made war against the West, may we be wise and discerning and seek to see him and the Russian people through the eyes and heart of Jesus. Lord forgive us our hypocrisy, judgement and certainties in our own righteousness.

You convict us to embrace widows and orphans as true religion and the sacrifice of a contrite heart. May those struggling to feed families, afford to heat homes or may have no home be welcomed by us as if welcoming Jesus as a friend. We pray for the lonely, the bereaved and isolated that as a church we may be a place of belonging and love for all who wish to shelter and seek sanctuary in the embrace of God. Amen

The National Day of Reflection—Wednesday 23rd March

The 23rd March will be the second anniversary of the start of the first national lockdown in response to the Corona virus pandemic. Back in 2020 we had little idea about the way in which this new virus would reshape our daily lives in the days to come, would galvanise the world's scientists to discover and develop vaccines at unprecedented speed, and would challenge our health professionals to the extreme. Few of us would have suspected the scale of loss and pain, through bereavement, illness, separation and isolation that we would face as a country, but also as families and individuals.

While life now is beginning to return to 'normal' many of us still need the opportunity to reflect, grieve and pray in the face of all that we have experienced. Doing this together will help us to find healing and hope for the future.

On 23rd March, St Mary's will be open during the day from 11am to 1pm for all of us, if we would like this opportunity. At noon we will mark the national silence and have a few prayers. There will also be the chance to leave your own written prayers, to light a candle in memory of a loved one and to place a daffodil as a sign of hope. Clergy and volunteers will be on hand to talk and help.
