Advance notice! This month has five Sundays, and as usual we'll be taking the fifth as an opportunity for a joint benefice service, where we join together with the congregation of St Mary's to worship, pray, learn, and get to know each other better. On Sunday 29th January we will join together at St Mary's for a Eucharist, and to hear Susan Littlemore, a speaker from Christians Against Poverty - see below for more information about CAP. As we aim to bring all our church members together in the one service on this Sunday, there won't be a 9am Eucharist at St Mary's that day.

Christians Against Poverty was founded in 1996 by John Kirkby. He believed God was calling him to sacrifice his career in finance and use his knowledge of the industry to help those in need. In his hometown of Bradford, John began to use his expertise to help ordinary people weighed down by debt and unable to make ends meet, to support families facing eviction and to bring hope to desperate people trapped by poverty. In partnership with local churches and other committed volunteers trained counsellors. John expanded the network of CAP centres to other areas of the country. Today, as well as offering debt help, Christians Against Poverty offer practical advice about living well on a low income through Life Skills groups, and support people stepping into employment through CAP Job Clubs. Through this UK-wide network of projects. CAP have a vision of transformed lives, thriving churches and an end to UK poverty. All Christians and churches are invited to be part of this essential service of others.

Caring for each other at church during infectious times-UPDATE

Our Worship Committee, on behalf of the PCC, continue to discuss the precautions we should take at St Guthlac's. We would urge everyone to continue thinking about the best ways to ensure that illnesses are not spread at church, for instance staying at home if you feel unwell. Please also continue to be understanding of those people whose response to the hazards of the virus is different to your own.

Following a successful trial at our midweek Communions, we will now be offering the wine as well as the bread to everyone at Sunday morning Eucharists - if you would like to take it. "Simultaneous Communion" means that the priest will take each wafer one at a time and dip the edge into the chalice of wine, before placing it in the Communicants hands as usual. This allows for the sharing of wine from a Common Cup, but without the hazards of each person actually using the Cup themselves.

The priests officiating at Communion will sanitise their hands before taking the bread and wine to the congregation. They will not wear a mask as they now mix normally at all other times.

The Wardens and I would be very pleased to have your feedback on this way of receiving, so do please let us know what you think when you've tried it out a few times.

Thank you for your understanding and co-operation with these changes and precautions – this way we can remain both safe and welcoming!

WHAT IS FAIRTRADE?







Fairtrade is a system of certification that aims to ensure a set of standards are met in the production and supply of a product or ingredient. Together with Fairtrade farmers and workers there is a vision: a world in which trade is based on fairness so that producers earn secure and sustainable livelihoods. For farmers and workers, Fairtrade means workers' rights, safer working conditions and fairer pay. For shoppers it means high quality, ethically produced products.

What does Fairtrade do?

- Fairtrade works with farming co-operatives, businesses and governments to make trade fair
- Fairtrade sets social, economic and environmental standards for the companies and farmers involved in the supply chain. For farmers and workers, the standards include protection of workers' rights and the environment. For companies they include the payment of the Fairtrade Minimum Price safety net and an additional Fairtrade Premium.
- Fairtrade certifies ingredients and products, using an independent organisation to check that Fairtrade Standards have been met by the farmers, workers and companies that are part of the product supply chains. In order to reassure consumers that this has happened, the use of the FAIRTRADE Mark on products and packaging is licenced, to signal that standards have been met.



- Through Fairtrade Towns, Schools and Faith groups, and through campaigns, awareness of the issues of unfair trade is driven and the public is asked to choose Fairtrade.
- Fairtrade works with partners to support specific issues, from Bolivian coffee farmers tackling the plant diseases linked to climate change, to cocoa-growing communities creating the Women's School of Leadership in Côte d'Ivoire
- Fairtrade pays the FAIRTRADE PREMIUM, which is what sets Fairtrade apart from everyone else: It's an additional sum of money, over and above the Fairtrade price, which goes into a communal fund for workers and farmers to use as they see fit to improve their social, economic and environmental conditions



Choosing Fairtrade means standing with farmers for fairness and equality, against some of the biggest challenges the world faces. It means farmers creating change, from investing in climate friendly farming techniques to developing women in leadership.

THE POWER IS IN YOUR HANDS

With Fairtrade you change the world a little bit every day. Through simple shopping choices you are showing businesses and governments that you believe in fair and just trade.
