PRAYERS

Praying for the World: Sunday 16th July is Disability Awareness Day - and around the world an estimated 1.3 billion disabled people (one in six of us) frequently and routinely suffer discrimination, exclusion, unequal access to health and other services, and even violence. Pray for changing attitudes in all nations and a greater recognition of universal human rights, as well as the value of all our differing abilities and experiences. Pray especially for all those who suffer stigma, discrimination, poverty, exclusion because of their disability.

Disability Awareness Day – Sunday 16th July

"Disability Awareness Day" promotes a can-do culture focusing on what disabled people can do throughout life and work."

For Christians a big part of our life is church, church family and using our giftings, what we can do, for the kingdom. This is just the same for disabled Christians as it is for non-disabled Christians. 1 Corinthians 12:5-6 teaches us that every single person has different gifts from God and that we are all called to serve and use those giftings. The Bible has lots of disabled people in it who contributed to the history of God's people.

Let's look at just a few and consider what we can learn from how God responded to them:

- Moses was too frightened to speak in front of Pharaoh because he had a speech defect (Exodus 4:10-16). God provided support for him in the form of his brother Aaron who was his spokesperson.
- Elijah had serious mental health problems. The day after his great triumph he was in hiding, suicidally depressed and begging God to take his life (1 Kings 19). God's response was to provide him with food and a safe place to rest and to speak to him in a very gentle way.
- People believe that Nicodemus may well have been autistic. He had a very detailed and complete knowledge of Jewish law, he came to Jesus in a quiet dark place, he struggled to understand the metaphor of being born again, he tried to save Jesus by using his knowledge. All of this falls into autistic characteristics.

Another autistic person in the bible is said to be the apostle Matthew.

• When Jesus is resurrected and returns to his disciples, they were scared, they had many doubts. Jesus said to Thomas "Put your finger here, see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side". His hands, feet and side held the marks of significant physical disability. In the resurrected Christ we see a holy and whole, yet disabled, God. His injury is part of him. Not as a punishment, not as an opportunity for healing. The perfect, all-powerful, all-knowing Christ is resurrected with a disability.

Dear God, thank you for the clear example of disability inclusion in the bible, for the challenge that sets us. We ask for your wisdom as we seek to challenge our own biases and prejudice. Help us to focus on the 'can do' culture and to recognise the giftings of every single person in your kingdom. We pray that our churches will be places where all people are able to fully belong and be active members of the church family. Amen.

EcoTip for July: Lending a helping hand in hot weather. Help hedgehogs in hot weather. Hedgehogs particularly need help in a heatwave, as their usual prey of slugs, snails and worms are often unavailable. Leaving out a juicy snack, such as mealworms or canned dog food, can help in sustained warm weather. If you have a garden pond, ensure there's always a way for hedgehogs (and other small mammals) to climb out if they fall in.

Dear Friends,

'A BRIGHTER BUILDING' - a new appeal. Will you help fund the repair and re-decoration of St Guthlac's?

Over the last year we have all had to bear the consequences of the "cost-of-living-crisis" - everyone's budget has been squeezed, and some very tightly indeed.

Firstly therefore, I want to pass on the grateful thanks of the St Guthlac's Church Council and myself, for your continuing financial support through your giving to the Church. Your donations and fundraising are essential – they enable the Church to maintain and expand our Christian life together, and to keep our focus on outreach and support in the local community and beyond.

Given the challenging times in which we live, it is more important than ever that everyone can find a welcoming space where we can worship God together and grow in the faith that gives us hope and security – and for many of us, that place is the local church.

This is why I am writing to you now. We want to ensure that St Guthlac's is once again 'A Brighter Building' for meeting together and worship - and so today we are launching a new appeal for the funds needed for essential repairs and redecoration.

The interior of the church was last painted many years ago, and after the installation of the new heating system the intention was always to completely redecorate and make good. Now that some considerable time has gone by, we are also concerned that the building will deteriorate if we don't act soon; we know that spending money now will save higher costs in the future and want to nip any problems in the bud. The other building issue is that two areas of flooring have become weak and potentially unsafe – you may have seen the 'hazard' tape in the chancel area but there is also an area in the vestry that needs attention. Both areas will need to be taken up before repair, and more, unforeseen, problems may then become apparent.

We are now launching our 'A Brighter Building' Appeal for £20,000, so that we can carry out these essential works.

Raising this amount will certainly be a challenge for us, but I am confident that

"God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4.19)

The Bible reminds us many times about God's incredible generosity towards us, and exhorts us all to reflect that generosity in our own giving:

"Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously.... for God loves a cheerful giver." (2 Corinthians 9.6 & 7)

So, can I urge you to consider how *you* can contribute to our appeal to create 'A Brighter Building'? Our Appeal Donation Pack gives you all the information you need to make either a one-off gift or a regular contribution.



Bee Keeper of Aleppo

Nuri is a beekeeper, his wife, Afra, an artist. They live a simple life, rich in family and friends, in the beautiful Syrian city of Aleppo - until the unthinkable happens. When all they care for is destroyed by war, they are forced to escape though Asia and Europe. This is a beautifully written story of a couple's flight from war-torn Aleppo to the UK. It is gripping, sad and thought-provoking.

A story based on real events. Nisha has left Sri Lanka to go to Cyprus to support her mother and young daughter. She goes to work for Petra. For Petra, it is only natural to hire a domestic worker to keep her house clean and her family fed. Their lives have nothing in common, except the love they feel for their daughters. Then one day, Nisha vanishes. No one cares about the disappearance of a foreign domestic worker, except Petra and Nisha's secret lover, Yiannis.
