It shows the volume of patient numbers, the range of illnesses treated and some of the challenges. We do our best to send out visits every month though it is the rainy season at present which can make visits impossible. I am in the process of seeking to raise enough funds for trips to begin again around April. For most of this year trips have cost £545 per trip. Range of ailments seen and treated	Ailments treated are: Common cold, Otitis media, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, Asthma, Tonsillitis, Diarrhea, Dysentery, Malaria, Anemia, Malnutrition, Hypertension, Epilepsy, Conjunctivitis, Cataract, Dental decay, Scabies, Fungal infection, Dermatitis, Impetigo, Urticaria, Worms, Bilharzia, Abscess, Hernia, Peptic ulcers and STI's.
Challenges	High patient volumes hence limited resources in screening, lab testing, data entry and dispensing Lack of tables for screening and dispensing Poor data entry because it is manually done – prone to human errors, time consuming, data inconsistency, difficult in data retrieving and quick analysis Lack of pre-packing of common prescriptions/drugs Some patients do not follow up with their referrals to the hospital
Suggested Solutions	 Implement a triage system to identify patients who need immediate attention and those who can wait. This will ensure critical cases are addressed first and reduces overcrowding.
