Are you ready to confirm your faith in 2026?

As the New Year arrives on the horizon, you may be feeling that you'd like to take another step on your own journey in faith, or perhaps mark a return to a deeper experience of Christian faith and life in recent times. In the Anglican tradition, one way to confirm your faith in this way is a service of 'Confirmation', in which the Bishop asks for God's Holy Spirit to bring a special blessing to each person now moving forward in their Christian belief.

Towards the end of April, a Confirmation service will be held at Leicester Cathedral, and so now is the time to consider if 'being confirmed' is something you would like to do. Preparing for confirmation takes a few regular meetings with one of the clergy, as part of a small group, to consider the essentials of Christian belief and, in particular, how they have an impact on the way we live our daily lives – these meetings are based on discussion and friendship and there are no tests!

If you think that confirmation may be for you in 2026, then please have a word and find out more from Adrian, Cecilia, Janet or Aphro.

Minster Community proposal writing stage

Following the hard work that each of the seven working groups (WGs) undertook, the coordinating group used the summaries generated by the WGs to take to the Sensemaking day at St Hugh on 27th Sept. The process of sensemaking led to additional thoughts being added to the summaries. We also had the chance to discuss: the stresses and tensions, larger insights, opportunities and gaps.

The next stage in the process of forming a Minster Community is '**writing the proposal**'. Once drafted this will be circulated to PCCs for comment and eventually taken through various stages within the diocese before coming back to the PCC for approval.

To write the proposal we need a 'writing group'. This needs to be a group of no more than 4-5 people. With the existing members of the co-ordinating group, we need no more than 1 or 2 additional volunteers to join the writing group. The writing group volunteers will each need to write sections of the proposal, to comment on the drafts of the proposal as they are generated and to contribute to editing the proposal to get it to its final stage. This will involve meeting several times over the course of the 3 months Jan to March 2026.

If you have writing and editing skills and you feel you would like to volunteer to be a member of the writing group, **please contact Fiona.** Please can you give examples of how you use/have used your writing and editing skills. This is so that in the event that we have more than 2 volunteers we are able to match these up to existing skills and fill the gaps.

Thank you for your contribution to the formation of the MC3 Teal Minster Community. We would not have been able to get to this stage without your focus, commitment and help.

Bishop's Chaplaincy Lecture - Lord Alan Beith
Wednesday January 28, 5.30pm-8pm – St Andrew's, 53
Jarrom Street, Leicester

Law lies at the heart of the Christian and Jewish traditions, and underpins the British constitution itself. Yet today, critics call it 'rule by judges' and others argue that unjust laws need not be obeyed. In a world of shifting values and contested authority, does law still matter?

Join us for the Bishop's Chaplaincy Lecture, delivered by Lord Alan Beith, who will explore the place of law in public life, the tensions it now faces, and why it continues to matter.

Lord Alan Beith served as the Liberal Democrat MP for Berwick-upon-Tweed from 1973 until 2015, when he entered the House of Lords. He was the Deputy Leader of the Liberal Democrats for 17 years and served variously as the Party's spokesperson for Constitutional Affairs, Treasury Affairs, and for the Lord Chancellor's Department. He has been a Methodist circuit lay preacher for 60 years, and founded the Historic Chapels Trust, which cares for Nonconformist and Roman Catholic churches and chapels which are no longer used for worship.


